NO RECORDER ELECTED. THE ALDERMANIC MEETING LAST NIGHT.

A Considerable Amount of Work Done, But Not the Slightest Reference to the Important Record-ership.

The board of aldermen met in regular session last night. But they didn't elect a recorder for the city of Asheville.

Mayor Blanton presided over the meeting and all the aldermen were present.

TAX RELEASE. Col. Reuben McBrayer appeared before the board and asked that Dr. W. P. Whittington be released from the payment of \$30.60, tax on property which at listing time was the property of the First Baptist church. His request was complied with.

STREET CROSSINGS. J. M. Gidger, in behalf of the children attending Montford avenue school and the members of the committee, asked the board to put down crossings at the corner of Haywood street and Montford avenue, and at the corner of Montford avenue and Cherry street. The street superintendent was instructed to do the work.

THE CHURCH STREET SIDEWALK. F. Stickleather complained to the board of the obstructions that are on the sidewalk on Church street, at the Soudley building. The street committee was instructed to look after the matter.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE COMMUNICATION. W. F. Randolph, secretary of the city schools committee, sent a letter to the board, stating that for the first four months of the present school year the committee had to borrow \$4,100, to pay teachers' salaries; and this amount was procured by the individual notes of the members of the committee. Only about \$2,000 had been deposited to the credit of the schools by the city. The teachers' salaries for January are about due, and the notes given for construction of Orange street school are past due. In addition there are bills for necessary supplies from merchants to the amount of \$500.

The committee asked that an amount sufficient to liquidate the indebtedness be placed at their disposal as soon as possible. This the board agreed to do, with the emphasis on the last three words.

WARRANT ON TAX ACCOUNTS. Richmond Pearson asked that he be credited on his tax account with \$487.75 for grading of Market street. The matter was laid over for a week and the city engineer instructed to measure the work done and estimate the cost.

THOS. D. JOHNSTON asked that he be credited on his tax account with \$24, paid for work on Water street. Decried.

A PLANK SIDEWALK. Prof. Claxton asked the board to put down a plank sidewalk on Bridge and Orange streets, near the Orange street school, to enable the school children to get to school without getting lost in the mud. Referred to the street superintendent.

OTHER MATTERS. The clerk was instructed to correspond with the Gamewell fire alarm company and ask an extension of sixty days on the debt of \$1,000 owed them by the city.

P. C. ORPIN's request for a permit to erect a steam engine and mill in rear of Woodbury's stable was refused.

Two bills were ordered paid: Joe Carter, for blacksmithing, \$2.20; Frank O'Donnell, for repairs to hook and ladder truck, \$9.00. At 9:40 the board adjourned.
