## MR. H. T. COLLINS ACCEPTS.

BUT HE IS FOR THE IMPROVEMENT ACT.

Consequently he cannot run on the Platform Mr. Demens Has Put Forth as That of the Republicans.

To the Citizens of Asheville:  
Referring to the announcement made in last evening's CITIZEN and Journal that my name has been proposed for mayor upon an independent ticket, I beg to submit the following:  
First—I am willing to appear before the community as a people's candidate, irrespective of party, but cannot be bound by the published resolutions accompanying my nomination.

Second—With reference to the improvement Act, which is the leading issue in this election, with regard to it I believe it to be far better than a general tax for street improvements, provided the Act is administered by an honest and efficient board of officers.

Third—I have no political or partisan aspirations whatever, but deem it the duty of every citizen in matters of public interest and importance to waive personal preferences and be governed by what appears to be the best for the whole community.

Fourth—With the understanding that my views are expressed herein, I accept the nomination and, if elected, shall do everything in my power to secure an honest, fair and economical administration of the city government.

**THE PRIMARY.**

**AN AGED WOMAN'S DEATH.**  
The Oldest Sister of Col. A. T. Davidson Dead.

Mrs. Margaret E. Gaston died at her home on Newfound, in this county, Thursday April 10, at 10.15. The interment took place at Dix Creek chapel yesterday afternoon, at 3 o'clock.

Mrs. Gaston was one of Buncombe's oldest residents. She was born in this county in February, 1805, and was more than 86 years old at the time of her death. She was the oldest child of W. M. Davidson and was a sister of Col. A. T. Davidson, of this city. In 1821 she married Joseph H. Walker, a son of Felix Walker, and with him went to Mississippi in 1847. Her husband died there in 1841. In 1842, after returning to her native state, she was again married, this time to Thos. L. Gaston, of this city and well known here.

She lived a long and laborious life and served her day and generation well. It will be her lot to be buried in the cemetery here. "She hath done what she could," she rests well.

## THE FAIR ASSOCIATION.

WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA TO HAVE ONE.

Good Meeting Held in the Court House This Morning—Committees Appointed and a Mass Meeting to be Held.

A meeting of the citizens of Asheville and the committee appointed by the county alliance yesterday was held in the court house this morning at 10 o'clock. Among those present were: J. M. Campbell, D. A. Blackwell, H. L. King, G. S. Powell, T. B. Long, Natt Atkinson, W. J. Zachary, W. H. Malone, R. McBrayer, W. F. Tomlinson, H. C. Jodes, W. P. Cheesboro, John Cheesboro, J. D. Cameron, J. M. Ray, D. S. Watson, T. C. Starnes, N. Plamondon, J. W. Nash, J. M. Brookshire, R. B. Vance, J. B. Brewer, W. T. Reynolds, G. W. Parshley, F. Schlenker, W. A. James, G. E. Boggs and J. A. May, of Haywood.

Mr. Boggs was called to the chair, and Capt. Natt Atkinson introduced a resolution as follows:

"Whereas the necessity and demand for a Western North Carolina association is now apparent to all and is a matter that should no longer be delayed or neglected to the end that the resources and products of our section should be exhibited annually at some central point therefore be it resolved:

Resolved, That the chairman of this meeting appoint, with the assistance of the clerk of the superior court of the different counties of Western North Carolina one delegate from each voting precinct of the different counties and a member of the board of the county commissioners of the counties to meet in this city on Tuesday, April 30, for the purpose of forming said association and to set on foot or formulate a plan for holding a fair.

Resolved further, That a committee of three be appointed to receive propositions for a site and report at the above meeting."

Col. T. B. Long introduced an amendment requesting the president of each county alliance to send one delegate from his county alliance. G. S. Powell introduced an amendment to the effect that the chairman appoint a committee of three from the alliance and three from the city for the purpose of receiving propositions for a site suitable for holding a Western North Carolina fair and to report back to a mass meeting to be held at this place on the 30th of April.

It seemed to be the sense of the meeting that the fair was not to be for the alliance only, or for any individual, class or town, but for the entire western part of North Carolina. Short speeches to this effect were made by W. H. Malone, Col. Long, Col. McBrayer, Mr. Plamondon, President Nash and Mr. Boggs.

The resolution of Captain Atkinson as amended by Messrs. Long and Powell was adopted unanimously.

Mr. Powell then introduced a resolution as follows:

"Resolved, That we the farmers and business men of Western North Carolina have decided to organize a Western North Carolina fair association and to that end call for a mass-meeting to be held in the court house in Asheville on Thursday the 30th of April, 1891, for the purpose of perfecting such organization and call upon every citizen interested in the upbuilding of our section to be present and participate in said organization."

On motion Mr. Powell's resolution was adopted unanimously.

The charter obtained by Geo. S. Powell, R. Pearson, W. W. Barnard, M. J. Bearden, J. E. Rankin, J. S. Adams, C. D. Blanton, J. B. Bostic, T. H. Cobb, J. M. Campbell, J. M. Ray and J. E. Dickerson, for the "Montford Park Fair Association," was read and was tendered by Mr. Powell for the use of any who might want it. A vote of thanks was given Mr. Powell on motion of Col. Long.

The charter gives the rights belonging to fair associations and for 99 years. The capital stock is placed at \$50,000, with power of increasing to \$250,000, the shares to be of the value of \$100 each.

Gen. Vance introduced a resolution suggesting that a committee of three, consisting of attorneys, be appointed to look into the charter tendered by Mr. Powell and to report if the charter is such as is wanted and also if it can be used with the name of the association changed to the Western North Carolina Fair Association." Adopted. The chair appointed on the committee: Gen. R. B. Vance, G. S. Powell and Col. McBrayer. The chairman was added to the committee.

The chair appointed as the committee from Asheville of six to receive propositions for the site Natt Atkinson, G. S. Powell and J. M. Ray; from the alliance, D. A. Blackwell, B. J. Alexander and Paris H. Folsom; from the city, a resolution introduced by R. M. Furman, secretary Tomlinson was instructed to request the chairman of the county alliances to communicate with the sub-alliances concerning the fair and to ask their co-operation. Adjourned, sine die.

After adjournment the committee on the charter met and Col. McBrayer was instructed to look into the legal points of the charter.
