FRENCHMEN AND RUSSIA.

THEY WILL NOT HEAR IT DENOUNCED.

A Significant Demonstration at a Geographical Lecture—This is Good Reading for Emperor William.

TOULOUSE, May 11.—M. Rabot, the explorer, was lecturing last night at this place, his subject being "Siberia." During the course of his lecture M. Rabot severely criticised the Russian administration of Siberia and told the audience that he desired to caution Frenchmen not to be carried away by a sentimental impulse.

These remarks caused M. Robert, president of the Geographical society, to protest vigorously against the statements made by M. Rabot. Finally the president of the Geographical society waved his hand vigorously over his head and shouted: "Vive la Russie!"

This cry was followed by a scene of wild enthusiasm, and general cheering of the audience, shouting itself hoarse in an effort to show the feeling of friendship animating it in regard to Russia.

A PANIC AND A BOMB.

Portuguese Securities Fallen—Troubled Finance.

PARIS, May 12.—1 p. m.—A panic prevails on the bourse and Portuguese securities have fallen to 39.

LISBON, May 12.—In the midst of the alarm caused here by a financial panic today a sensation was caused by an explosion supposed to be the work of the republican party. It took place in the ministry of the interior and was caused by a dynamite bomb which made a tremendous report and did considerable damage, spreading alarm in many quarters.

There is no clue to the actual perpetrator of the outrage, which, owing to the excited state of the public mind, is being magnified in importance.

THE KELLY CASE.

The College of Bishops Sustain Bishop Hargrove.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 12.—A sensation was created in Methodist circles by the publication today of the decision of the college of bishops in its recent session at Wilmington, N. C., in the now famous Kelly case.

Bishop Hargrove's rulings were sustained except in a single instance, the decision being that the conference should not have denied the right of appointing the trial committee, which was named by the bishop.

TAXES PULLMAN.

The Supreme Court Affirms a Judgment Against Him.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The supreme court to-day affirmed the judgment of the supreme court of Pennsylvania in case of the Pullman Palace Car company against the
