The Last Session of the Episcopal Convention-Business Concluded and Adjourned Sine Die-Personal Notes.

The afternoon session of the second day of the Protestent Episcopal convention for the diocese of North Carolina, was called to order yesterday by Dr. M. M. Marshall, the president.

The committee appointed to devise ways and means for enlarging the Episcopal fund reported that they deemed it inexpedient to undertake to enlarge the ent illness, and in the loss of his most est fund at this time, but that if the convention thought otherwise the committee to visit the parishes of the diocese for that purpose. Considerable discussion followed, and later, in order to bring the question squarely before the convention for a vote, Mr. Wilkes introduced unother resolution, "That this con-


