DETROIT, Aug. 8 .- Great excitement revailed in Windsor, Canada, last evening. Citizens who have a leaning towards American principles and the United States government decorated their places of business in honor of the G. A. R. celebration in this city. Minister of Militia Caron was telegraphed to by Windsor loyalists who were wrathy because the Canadians made so much of what they termed "Americanism," and requested that he instruct the authorities
