THE CITY'S IMPROVEMENT.

WHAT IS REQUIRED OF THE CONTRACTORS.

In Order That Work May be Properly Done.

In view of the fact that work on the streets is soon to be begun THE CITIZEN reproduces some of the more important requirements of the specifications for such work.

The contractor shall have charge of and be responsible for the entire line of works until their completion and acceptfinal completion and acceptance of the work done under this contract shall be corrected immediately on the requirement of the engineer. The contractor will be required to execute the work in such manner so as to interrupt as little as possible the public use of the street. He will be held responsible for all practicable and legal notice and sig-ing four per cent. bond, and that they nals to the public, of the condition of the street while the work progresses, and rate of interest, shall keep a bright red light burning dur-

ing the entire night at each end of the

work, and at such other points as may essary, or the engineer directs. All loss or damage due to negligence or arising out of the nature of the work to be done, or from any unforescen or un-usual obstructions or difficulties which may be encountered in the prosecution of the same, or from the action of the elements, will be sustained by the con-tractor, who will be required, without cost to the city, to replace all work dis-placed or injured by them, and to remove from the street all surplus material, earth, rubbish, etc., immediately after completion of the work, which must be deposited at such points as the engineer may direct, provided the average haul of same shall not exceed fifteen hundred feet. The contractor will be required to keep in repair for twelve months after its completion, the whole of the work,

except in cases where the repairs may be

rendered necessary by causes clearly beyond his control. Work must be commenced within ten If not so completed, the pay of all in-spectors employed on the work after the time fixed for its completion will, in the discretion of the board, consisting of the mayor, board of aldermen and advi sory committee, be charged against and deducted from any money that may be due or become due the contractor, as well as the sum of ten dollars per diem for the same period, estimated as liquidated and fixed damages to the city, arising from failure to complete the work at the time specified-time of completion of contract being an essential element and consideration. Failure to

ther parties to complete it. any work alleged to be extra work, un-less the same shall be done in pursuance of a written order from the board, and unless also claim be made therefor to the board, at or before the first payment after the alleged work is executed; it beng agreed by the parties hereto that all work of whatever character otherwise done or failed to be claimed as above stated, shall be held to be work required

y this contract. Payments will be made monthly, pro-vided the progress of the work is satisfacto be withheld until the final payment, which will only be made on certificate of whatever shall be made or allowed the contractor for damages or interest in the event said estimates are not promptly paid by the city, or any delay caused by

the city or her agents.

Bond in the sum of one-third of the approximate amount of the contract, with two or more securities satisfactory to the board, will be required for the faithful performance of the contract. Contractors will punctually pay the workmen who shall be employed by the work under their contract in cash current, and not in what is denominated store pay or orders, and will, from time to time, and as often as may be required by the mayor, furnish to said mayor sat-isfactory evidence that all persons who have done work or furnished materials have been paid as bereis required. And if such evidence is not furnished, such sums as may be necessary for such pay ment may, in the discretion of the board be retained until such claims be fully sat-isfied.

No contract or any interest shall b transferred by the parties to whom the award is made. It is a condition of all contracts that such transfers will be null

No License in Charlotte Threat Tens to Close the Schools.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., February 16 .- On the first of January all the saloons in Charlotte were closed because the board Charlotte were closed because the board of county commissioners refused to grant licenses. There were thirteen saloons in licenses. There were thirteen saloons in Charlotte and they paid an annual city license tax of \$1,000 each. This license tax was appropriated to the support of the city graded schools. The refusal of the commissioners to renew the saloon licenses has cut off the source of revenue and the city aldermen at a recent meet-ing notified the school board that there is no money in the treasury to maintain he schools.

Papers have been served upon the ommissioners to appear before Judge Bynum on Tuesday, the 23d, and show why license should not be granted to certain applicants. Commissioners in various counties have been refusing applicants for license wholly upon the ground that no man who applies for license to sell whiskey can have a good moral character, and the whole state is nterested in the outcome of the Charlotte affair.
