**FIREMEN'S CONVENTION**  
IT IS NOW ONLY TWELVE DAYS AWAY.  
Fire Chief Powell Tells 'The Citizen' Something About the Big Event—The Fire Department is Working Harmoniously and the Affair Will be a Great Success.  
Twelve days from today! Then will occur the opening of the state firemen's convention in Asheville—Wednesday, July 13, the second day of the gala week.  
And a great time it will be for the firemen from all parts of the state. There will be a big crowd of them here, at least 100 delegates being expected to stay nothing of the teams that will come here to take part in the races and contest for prizes. Besides these, every company will bring a number of visitors—and Asheville will see such a gathering of life and property savers as she has never seen, and may never see again.  
But about the preparations.  
THE CITIZEN had a talk yesterday afternoon with Fire Chief George S.

Powell, with regard to progress towards the reception of the visitors.  
"The committee," Chief Powell said, "are all getting along very well. Those who subscribed to the fund for prizes, etc., are paying their subscriptions promptly, as a rule, and all is well along that line."  
"How about the late unpleasantness in the firemen's ranks?" he was asked.  
"Everything O. K." he replied.  
"That has all been settled," he replied. There is no difference between the members of the department, and all of them are working harmoniously together for one common end—the making of a thorough and successful convention.  
The men have taken heart with a will that shows a determination to leave nothing undone in showing the rest of the state what Asheville can do when she makes up her mind. It was at first feared that the new hose company would be barred from the contests on account of its recent formation. But the matter has been arranged satisfactorily, and the Asheville boys will be in the race by a big majority—hose men and hook and ladder men.  
"The committee has received letters from several companies in South Carolina that desire to do some business on this occasion if a prize is offered for an interstate contest. This is now being considered and I have no doubt the prize will be offered. It is a decidedly good idea and will add to the interest of the program, as well as bring more people to Asheville."  
The races will take place on Montford avenue, on the level stretch of street just opposite the park. The ground has been rolled and will be in the best possible condition for the event. You can tell everybody that the Asheville fire department is all right, the people of Asheville are all right, and we will treat the visitors all right. The convention is 'a go.'"  
**Take This In!**  
President W. B. Gwyn, of the Asheville and Crayg Mountain railway, has tendered the firemen the use of the dummy line for one day free of charge, and on Thursday of next week, July 7, they will run excursions to the pavilion on Sunset mountain, where there will be kept on sale refreshments of every kind. The object is to raise more funds for the races, and if possible increase the amount offered in prizes. The cause is a most worthy one, and the dummy line should be taxed to its utmost to carry the people who desire to help the firemen.  
There are doubtless many ladies in Asheville who are willing to assist in the way of furnishing cakes, ices, etc., or presiding over booths at the pavilion. Any of those so kindly disposed are requested to send their names, indicating what they propose to donate, to Fire Chief Powell, or Assistant Chief McDowell as early a date as possible. Remember the day, next Thursday, July 7.

**BARBECUE.**  
**A Pleasant Occasion in West Asheville Yesterday.**  
Yesterday morning R. M. Deaver, of West Asheville, circulated in all the region round about the news that he would give his neighbors and friends a barbecue dinner that day in one of the fine hilltop groves on his land just west of Smith's bridge. By ten o'clock everything was in readiness—chickens, beef, mutton, soda water, and every good thing to eat and drink that any temperance crowd could wish; and about a dozen men, women and boys went to work grinding and making coffee, barbecuing meats, making and distributing lemonade and ice cream. In the meantime about 100 persons gathered in the grove, and about 2 p. m. a sumptuous dinner was enjoyed. The Lindsey brass

band, with two pretty young ladies as members, gave delightful music.  
Mr. Hadden, a live prohibition worker, had provided a speaker in the person of Tilman R. Gaines, who entertained the assembly for about twenty minutes. The thanks of the assembly in the grove were extended to Mr. and Mrs. Deaver and their daughters, Mrs. Dr. L. B. McBrayer and Mrs. W. E. Logan, for the enjoyment of the day.

**RUN DOWN.**  
**North German Lloyd Steamer Sinks a Ship.**  
LONDON, June 30.—The North German Lloyd's steamer Trave, from New York, June 21 for Bremen, arrived at Southampton this morning. She had on board Capt. E. F. Hulbert, of the British ship Fred B. Taylor, from Havre May 12, for New York and nineteen of the crew of that vessel.  
The Trave was in collision with the Taylor June 22. The Taylor was so badly damaged that it is presumed on board the Trave, she sank shortly afterwards. The chief officer of the Taylor was crushed to death and Capt. Hulbert had his leg injured.

**AGAINST THE MOB**  
**Indictment Against the Officials of Port Jervis.**  
PORT JERVIS, June 28.—The grand jury of Orange county reconvened at Gosien today and examined ten or twelve new witnesses about the lynching of Bob Lewis. Last week after a five days' session the jury reported to Judge Cullen that they could not find sufficient evidence to indict anybody. The judge directed them to continue their efforts. The result was that no indictments were found against the lynchers, but the jury reported that they had found a true bill against the village official of Port Jervis, charging them with criminal negligence.

**Death in Shelby.**  
A telegram received here this afternoon by J. B. Bostic announced the death in Shelby at 11 o'clock this morning of W. C. Bostic. Mr. Bostic had been suffering for several days with pneumonia. He was 35 years of age and leaves a wife and five children. Messrs. J. B. J. T. and P. L. Bostic, brothers of the dead man, will leave Asheville tomorrow morning to attend the funeral.

**The Prohibitionists.**  
CINCINNATI, June 30.—When the prohibition convention was called to order today the platform committee was still in session. The committee on credentials reported 1972 delegates present, Louisiana and South Carolina being the only states not represented.

**Police Report.**  
According to the reports of Recorder Miller and Chief of Police McDowell there were during the month of June just closing 178 arrests by the patrolmen on the force.  
The total amount of fines was \$626, of which \$470.65 was collected in cash. The costs in all of the cases was \$24.

**Lynched.**  
NASHVILLE, June 30.—Tom Lillard (colored), who outraged Miss McKnight near Woodbury on Monday, was lynched by a mob at that place last night about 11 o'clock.

**Argument Closed.**  
The argument in the habeas corpus case before Judge Shuford was concluded this morning. The judge will render his decision tomorrow at 12 o'clock.

**CUTTING SENATE FIGURES**  
**THE HOUSE FOR SMALLER APPROPRIATIONS.**  
**The Two Branches Continue to Agree to Disagree—A Big Sum For G. A. R. Entertainment in Washington—Differences on the Naval Bill.**  
WASHINGTON, June 30.—In the house today Mr. Torney, from the committee on appropriations, reported back the legislative appropriation bill with the senate amendments and moved that the amendments be non-concurred in and conference ordered. The motion was agreed to.  
It took the conferees on the naval appropriation bill just about half an hour this morning to agree to disagree and to report that disagreement to their respective houses. The points at issue are the increases in the naval establishment made by the senate amendments, including the provision for six torpedo boats, one sea-going battle ship, one harbor defence vessel of the Monitor type and four light-draught gun boats. The house conferees also refused to accept the senate amendment appropriating money for

**AS ACCESSORY.**  
**The Trial of S. E. Shelton at Marshall Yesterday.**  
Julius C. Martin, of the legal firm of Guder & Martin, has returned from Marshall, where he was engaged in the prosecution of S. E. Shelton, who was charged with aiding and abetting Wm. M. Shelton in the murder of Grant Tweed on Spill Creek, Madison county, about two weeks ago.  
Shelton was bound over to the next term of court in the sum of \$500, as an accessory after the fact. He is a nephew of the man who killed Tweed. The murderer is still in Greeneville, Tenn., being held until requisition papers are granted.

**IS THIS ENGLISH OR IRISH SPIRIT OF FAIRNESS?**  
DUBLIN, June 30.—Dr. Tanner, protected by 100 policemen, attempted to address a political meeting at Euam. The Parnellite's seized the speaker's platform before the arrival of the Tannerite's. Dr. Tanner made determined efforts to get on the platform, and each time was knocked down. Finally the platform was pulled down and Tanner was caught beneath it. Then a fight began and waxed fast and furious. The police were compelled to charge the mob with drawn swords. This had the desired effect and the mob was dispersed.

**2,350 Cases of Scarlet Fever.**  
LONDON, June 30.—A scarlet fever epidemic prevails in London. Already 2,350 cases are reported. The asylum board is causing huts to be hastily erected on the grounds of the hospitals for the reception of patients suffering with the disease.
