IT IS A SHREWD TRICK

THE THIRD PARTY WILL DENOUNCE THE FORCE BILL.

But It Cannot Get Into Power To

Make a Force Bill Impossible—

A Scheme To Draw Off Demo-

cratic Votes.

OMAHA, Neb., July 1.—Delegates to the

people's party convention are already

gathering. The platform which Chair-

man Taubeneck, of the national execu-

tive committee, has in his pocket and

which leading spirits of the party agree

shall be adopted for the coming cam-

paign, contains a denunciation of the

Republican force bill, and it will be as

ringing and emphatic as the arraignment

of the democratic national convention a

week ago.

The leaders of the independent party

having given this subject the most care-

ful consideration, have weighed its

effects in all its details, and they an-

nounce now that the die is cast, that

the force bill of the republican party

will be denounced by them as an unwar-

ranted, dangerous and unconstitutional

interference in state elections.

The announcement of Chairman Tau-

beneck of the national committee, that

he favors such a plank, is regarded as

practically settling the matter, as Tau-

beneck being a northern man and of a

republican affiliation, would be natu-

rally expected to oppose the declaration

if the opposition were to be encountered.

But Taubeneck is one of the warmest

advocates of the plank, and says it

means the electoral votes of the southern

states for the people's party's presiden-

tial candidate.

KNIGHTS OF HONOR

A Pleasant Celebration of the Or-

der's Anniversary.

Nearly 200 members and friends of

Swannanoa lodge No. 646, Knights of

Honor, met in Hilliard hall last evening

to take part in the celebration of the

nineteenth anniversary of the Knights

of Honor.

The exercises were opened with sing-

ing, followed by J. J. Hill in an ad-

dress on the workings of the order

since its organization nineteen years ago

in Louisville, Ky. Mr. Hill's address

was comprehensive and enjoyed by all

present.

An address was also delivered by P.

A. Cummings, referring more particu-

larly to the work done by the Asheville

lodge. This lodge was organized Octo-

ber 10, 1873, with seventeen charter

members. Since that time there have

been 102 members, at one time, but

deducting for suspensions, withdrawals

by card, and deaths, the membership

now stands at 51. Since the lodge was

organized there has been paid into the

supreme lodge, in the way of assessments,

\$19,352.25. There has been, including

claim now under adjustment, paid back

by the supreme lodge for death bene-

fits, \$20,000, making a balance

in favor of the lodge of \$647.75. The

members who have died paid into the

widows' and orphans' fund \$2,455.80,

while the family of each of them have

received \$2,000.

The supreme lodge, at its last session

in May, adopted a new grade of assess-

ments for all new members who join

after July 1, and limiting assessments on

new members to one per month for the

first six months, and to two for the next

eighteen months.

At the close of Mr. Cummings' address

J. W. Summers gave a talk on the order

of the Knights and Ladies of Honor,

an organization similar to the Knights

of Honor, which ladies are allowed to

join.

When the literary part of the program

was disposed of these present reported

to the banquet room, where refreshments

in the shape of ice cream, cake, lemonade,

fruits, nuts, etc., were served.

The evening was delightfully spent by

all and the order will long be pleasantly

remembered by everyone who partici-

ated in the evening's entertainment.

A quantity of the refreshments were

not used, and these were sent today to

the Children's Home to gladden the

hearts of the little ones.
