THE CHOLERA'S SWIFT AD VANCE BY RAIL.

The Great London Authority on the Disease-Situation Around Paris-Poor Sanitation in Many

LONDON, July 23 .- A despatch to the Lancet from Paris says that the cholera in the suburbs of that city is stationary and exhibits no tendency to extension within the fortifications. Officially the disease is styled "epidemic choleriforme. It develops so slowly that time for prep uration to combat it can be readily taken. It does not seem to have taken root within the walls of the city. In a leader the Lancet says: "A new

cholera formerly took a long time to transit to the Caspian Sea.
"The danger is greater because the
countries traversedserve by their sanitary state to intensify the infection, whereas by the sea route to the Mediterranear

there is always a chance that the diseas aboard a vessel will die out.
"The amount of cholera in Russia lready serious. Taking only two days last week, the official (we fear incom-plete) returns report 1,300 deaths, of which number 812 occurred in towns on

the Volga.

"At the same time there has been no immediate indication of its rapid extension westward, and there is ground to hope that its customary route across the continent does not present the sanitary conditions favorable to the diffusion of cholera such as existed in 1854, when the disease last reached England by this

BUCHAREST, July 21 .- The Roumanian goverment has ordered a five days' quar-antine on the Russian frontier to preyent the introduction of cholera. As a matter of fact the whole frontier is closed to traffic from Russia, except at one station, and all the ports are closed to vessels arriving from Russian ports on the Dan

St. Petersnurg, July 21.-It is offi-cially stated that cholera has broken out in the government of Kuban, on the cast shore of the sea of Azof and the Black sea. Six deaths have occurred rom the disease in that government.

Next morning the wind changed and blew him toward the San Juan Archipelago. The captain saw it was impossible to make Karluk and turned the bow of the boat toward San

At night Capt, Vehling would shorten sail a bit, tie his rudder, and go to sleep in the cabin. He cooked his own meals, manned his own boat and was king and captain of all he looked upon. The Kus-siloff proved herself an excellent sailor. Early this morning Capt. Veiling got in sight of the Heads. He signalled for help, and the schooner Kodiac, which happened to be coming in, took the Kus-siloff in tow and brought her into the harbor.-N. Y. Sun.
