**HANDSOME GIFTS.**

**C. E. Graham Remembered by His Old Employees.**

The operatives of the C. E. Graham manufacturing company on yesterday afternoon gave, in a handsome and substantial manner, evidence of the esteem in which they hold the retiring treasurer and manager, C. E. Graham.

About 7 o'clock, when the whistle sounded to shut down the factory for the day, the 350 employees poured out of the doors and assembled in front of the factory to witness the presentation to Mr. Graham of a diamond scarf pin and a pair of link cuff buttons. The presentation speech was made by E. C. Barnhardt, superintendent of the mills, who said:

"Mr. Graham—I have been assigned the honor of speaking a few words to you, our retiring manager, in behalf of the operatives of the C. E. Graham manufacturing company.

"We regret very much that you have decided to sever your connection with this company. Some of us have been with you since the mill first started, and some only a short time, but by your many kind acts toward us you have endeared yourself to us all. In behalf of the operatives of the C. E. Graham manufacturing company, present to you this pin and these buttons, not for their intrinsic value, but to show in an humble way our gratitude to you for the kind treatment we have received through your management. We wish you God speed in any business in which you may engage."

Mr. Graham responded in a short speech, assuring his former employees of his appreciation of the gift.

The scarf pin was made of eight diamonds, crescent and star shaped. The cuff buttons were set with diamond, ruby and sapphire, the diamonds of a blue-white color, and the ruby and sapphire an oriental variety. Both presents were beautiful.

At the close of Mr. Graham's response, Theo. Y. Terrell, book-keeper, stepped forward and in the following speech presented to Mr. Graham a handsome gold headed cane:

"Mr. Graham—It is with a sense of deep and almost painful regret that we know you no longer as treasurer and General manager of this company, so pleasant have the associations always been between you and us.

"In token of the keen appreciation of your kind and courteous treatment I desire to present to you, in the name of the superintendent and book-keeper, this cane, not for its real or genuine value, but indicative of a heart-felt attachment to you."

Mr. Graham was almost overcome by the evidences of esteem, and spoke feelingly in response to Mr. Terrell's presentation speech.

The cane is of ebony, with a 14-karat gold head. The monogram "C. E. G." is engraved on the center of the head, while surrounding it are the words "Presented by E. C. B. and T. V. T. 1892." The head was engraved by Arthur M. Field of Asheville.

The occasion was one long to be remembered by Mr. Graham as well as his old employees.

**CLAIMS FOR OVER \$500,000 FOR LEGAL SERVICES OF LAWYERS.**

NEW ORLEANS, July 27.—The Myra Clark Gaines estate has finally been settled. The city of New Orleans has given W. W. Whitney, the administrator of the estate, a check for \$923,788, which pays this debt in full. Of this \$594,313 was for principal, the remainder for interest and costs. The estate recognizes claims against it for legal services of \$279,087, and disputes claims to the amount of \$379,000.

The following are some of the claims for legal services: Estate of Gen. Walter Jones of Washington, \$20,000; estate of the Hon. Bailey Peyton, of Tennessee, \$65,000; estate E. Sabour, \$50,000; estate M. E. Randolph, \$12,000; estate F. W. Meise, \$12,000; estate W. R. Mills, \$68,000; estate L. C. Campbell, ex-justice United States supreme court, \$10,000.

All of these lawyers, who managed the case in its earlier days, are dead. Messrs. T. J. Semmes and Alfred Goldthwaite, the latter dead, who managed the case during its latter days, have filed a claim for \$180,000 for legal services, which is now on appeal in the United States circuit court.—N. Y. Sun.

The following township executive committee was chosen: H. C. Hunt, H. B. Brown and H. S. Harkins.

The convention completed its work in about ten minutes. Tomorrow's convention will meet at noon for the purpose of electing delegates to the congressional, judicial and senatorial conventions.

**TO BE TESTED.**

**Democratic Reapportionment of Wisconsin In Question.**

MADISON, Wis., July 29.—It is stated that the constitutionality of the recent democratic reapportionment will be tested in the supreme court in August. A paper to be served on Attorney General O'Connor today will be in the form of a petition signed by some private citizen asking the attorney general to institute an action. If the attorney general refuses, the action can be brought in the name of the private citizen himself.

**Cleveland Is a Winner.**

DENVER, Col., July 29.—After a stormy session last night the democratic state central committee decided to call the democratic state convention for September 12, at Pueblo. This is a victory for the Cleveland or straight party men, in opposition to the fusionists or anti-Cleveland men.

**Declared Unconstitutional.**

LANSING, Mich., July 29.—The supreme court has handed down opinions declaring unconstitutional the two acts of the last legislature reapportioning the representatives and senatorial districts of the state.

**DRUNKARDS IN THE HOUSE**

A THIRD PARTY MAN MAKES THE CHARGE.

Other Representatives Indignant and an Investigation Ordered—Filibustering on the World's Fair Amendment.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The World's fair matter was delayed this morning in the house by a question of privilege raised by Mr. Wheeler of Alabama, relative to certain statements contained in a campaign book recently published by Representative Watson of Georgia, (alliance and third party man) reviewing the action of the present congress and the position taken by its members in the past. The house was thrown into a state of great confusion, resulting from the assertion by Mr. Watson, that every word written in the book to which Wheeler referred was literally true, and that he stood here ready to defend every word of them.

The assertion was greeted with prolonged hisses as the words charge that "drunken members speak upon grave matters."

Watson was promptly called to order by Mr. Tracy, of New York, who was indignant over the wholesale charges upon the house. Watson was then permitted to explain his language, but only reiterated his assertion as to the truth of the statement made by him and defied the house to do with him what it wished.

Mr. Boutner introduced a resolution calling for the appointment of a committee to investigate the truth of Watson's charge relative to the drunkenness of members of the house and to recommend what course shall be taken with respect to Watson if the charge was found to be untrue. Boutner asked for immediate action on the resolution and it was adopted without discussion.

It was after 1:30 when the house resumed consideration of the World's fair amendments to the sundry civil appropriation bill. Filibustering was immediately begun. Cummings of New York, assuming command of filibusters and Bailey, of Texas, acting as lieutenant.

**A FINE MEXICAN SHOW.**

Two Men Killed by a Bull—Americanians There.

SAN LUIS POTOSI, Mex., July 29.—Last night at a bull fight witnessed by electric light in a new ring near the city limits, there were fully 5,000 people present, among them being a number of American ladies and gentlemen tourists. The matador, Alberto Limertura, was in act of giving the third bull a fatal thrust with his short sword, when he slipped and fell. The frenzied bull had him on his horns in a moment and was goring him ferociously when three of the banderilleros rushed to the rescue. They flung their scarlet cloaks in front of the bull a number of times without attracting his attention from the fallen matador. Suddenly he charged upon one of the banderilleros, who sought protection behind a barrier erected for that purpose. The bull overtook him and caught him upon the sharp points of his horns, which penetrated through the man's body.

The crowd went wild with excitement, the Mexicans cheering the bull for his grand fighting qualities, and when the bugles sounded the call for the lassardos to come in, and throw the mad animal to be killed, the spectators protested against such action. The dead body of the banderillero remained upon the bull's horns till the animal was killed. Limertura, the matador, died while being removed from the ring. The performance was then stopped by the police.

**KING NEAR THE GALLOWS.**

Judge Jackson Denies the Right of Appeal.

NASHVILLE, July 29.—Col. H. Clay King, the aged murderer of David H. Poston is alarmingly near the gallows, notwithstanding the fight being made by his lawyers. United States circuit judge, Howell E. Jackson, today not only denied a petition for a writ of habeas corpus but denied the right of appeal. Judge Jackson reviewed the steamboat trip and said that the temporary absence from the state did not destroy or suspend their Tennessee citizenship. It did not affect their qualifications as jurors.

The defense will apply for a writ of error to remove the cause to the United States supreme court. If this fails the only recourse is to seek a pardon or commutation from Governor Buchanan.

**DEATHS FROM HEAT.**

Forty-two Cases in New York City in 22 Hours.

NEW YORK, July 29.—Up to 11:30 this morning, forty-two deaths from heat were reported at the coroner's office, all of which occurred since 2 o'clock yesterday p. m. Coroner Levy was called 11 times from his home last night to give permits in cases of persons who died during the night.

**Iams Will Hit Back.**

PITTSBURGH, July 29.—Three actions will be brought against Gen. Snowden, Col. Streater and Col. Hawkins by Private Iams by reason of his treatment at Camp Black, one of which will be for assault and battery, one for conspiracy to defame and for trespass and damages in \$10,000 will be claimed.

**Dying From Cholera.**

St. PETERSBURG, July 29.—Sixty-four deaths from cholera have occurred in Warsaw. The disease has also appeared in Acce, where three deaths were reported on Sunday. Of the 737 deaths in Moscow during the past week, nearly one-half were due to intestinal complaints.

**Nominated for Governor.**

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., July 28.—W. A. McCorkle was nominated for governor last night amid tremendous enthusiasm by the democratic convention.

**DID HE TRY TO COMMIT SUICIDE?**

The train which leaves the Asheville depot at 3:05 was rounding the bend yesterday when a man rushed to the platform and jumped off. His rash act created great excitement among the other passengers—they all thought it was a case of suicide.
