following infamous letter has just been

ter:

"Asheville, N. C., Oct. 28.—Ervin Al-

employed to look after illegal voting
in each county of this district. I am
going to Murphy today and I want you
to give me the name of a good man in
each township in your county to make
reports to me at Asheville at once.

"After the election I want you take
charge of your township in connection

once, according to the reward offered,
I can make some money. Enclosed
find addressed envelope. Report all the
cases you can get and I will compare them
with the reports of the Republican."

SAFFER ARRESTED.

The Federal Bulldozer Now in
Clutches of the State Law.

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 5.—A. W. Shaf-
fer, chief supervisor of elections and
United States commissioner, was ar-
rested here today by Deputy Sheriffs
Brooks and Walters, of O. F. Gregory,
clerk of Halifax county, charging him
with having issued a warrant for R. G.
Reid, a State registrar of election, and
had him arrested and taken to Raleigh,
warrant having been issued by Shaffer
wantonly, maliciously, and corruptly.
The warrant also sets forth that
Reid has used Shaffer and his two de-
puty supervisors, Geo. F. Shearin and
Alexander Robinson, for \$10,000 dam-
ages for false arrest.

Shaffer sent for his attorney, and,
going in charge of the deputy sheriffs
to the office of the clerk of the superior
court here, gave bond in \$500 for his ap-
pearance at Halifax the 14th instant,
United States Marshal J. B. Hill going
on his bond.—Richmond Dispatch.

and held him for five minutes until he
was thoroughly soaked. The gang then
tied him flat to a rail and beat him
on the face, and after shaving part of his
head threw him, still tied to the rail,
into a creek where his cries finally
brought help.

Terrible Gales on the Atlantic.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Vessels arriving at
Queenstown report that the weather on
the Atlantic continues very stormy.
The gales blow with a fury not often
witnessed even at this time of year, and
the largest steamers are impeded by
mountainous waves.

A Well Known Writer Dead.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—A Times despatch
from Teheran, states that Theodore
Child, who was making a literary tour
for Harper Bros., the American publish-
ers, died of cholera at Isphahan.

A Bear Cotton Report.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—A despatch to the
Times says the Egyptian cotton crop is
expected to exceed 495,000,000 pounds,
the yield greatly exceeding the best pre-
vious records.

Smallpox in Seattle.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 7.—Tacoma,
and this city has the smallpox. One
case developed Saturday and two yester-
day. A rigid quarantine has been es-
tablished.

Death of C. O. Foster.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 7.—Charles O.
Foster, ex-president of the Boston Sugar
refinery, died at 5:30 this morning.

How Prohibition Works.

COLETSBURG, Pa., Nov. 5.—Since
1852 no licenses to sell alcoholic bever-
ages of any kind in Potter county, Pa.,
have been granted. There is today more
liquor and beer sold and drunk in Prohi-
bition Potter county and more habitual
drunkenness than in any of the adjoining
counties where the license system pre-
vails.—N. Y. Sun.

Russia is Hard Up.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Advices from St.
Petersburg state that the government
has made futile endeavors to raise a loan
abroad to relieve its straightened ex-
chequer. The prospects for the winter
are gloomy.

MR. HARRITY'S LAST WORD

A DEMOCRATIC VICTORY IS
CERTAIN.

An Impending Political Revolu-
tion That Will Culminate To-
morrow Evening—New York,
Indiana and Connecticut Safe.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Chairman Har-
rity of the Democratic National com-
mittee, says of the conditions at the
closing of the campaign:

"Our confidence in the election of
Cleveland and Stevenson is increasing
hourly. A Democratic victory is abso-
lutely certain. All doubt has been re-
moved by full, conclusive, satisfactory
advices from all the Southern States in
which our opponents made pretences of
contest, as well as from New York,
Indiana, Connecticut, New Jersey, Michi-
gan and Wisconsin. Information from
the Western States justifies the hope that
the impending revolution will add a
number of electoral votes for Cleveland
as well as a loss of several others to Har-
rison in States heretofore Republican.
There are hopeful indications in New
England."

AGAINST HARRISON.

South Dakota Will Cast Its Elec-
toral Vote for Weaver.

YANKTON, S. D., Nov. 7.—Tremendous
excitement has been occasioned here in
political circles upon the announcement
that the Democratic State Central com-
mittee had passed the following resolu-
tion addressed to the Democratic voters
of South Dakota:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of the
Democratic State committee that the
Democratic voters of South Dakota cast
their votes for the Weaver electoral
ticket and thereby aid in electing our
standard bearer, Grover Cleveland and
Adlai E. Stevenson, and this committee
requests the co-operation of every Demo-
crat in this State to accomplish this."

These resolutions, it is claimed, mean
the defeat of the Harrison electors in
South Dakota.
