THE STANDPIPE COLLAPSE SAID TO BE THE CAUSE.

Resolution Adopted By the Joint Board, Asking the Privilege of Taking \$25,000 From the Street

Mayor Blanton wielded a new gavel in calling the Joint Board to order vesterday afternoon. The deliberators at this morning. the meeting were Aldermen Baird, Starues, Gudger, McDowell and Leonard, and every member of the Advisory com-

Advisor Williams brought up the question of the obstruction on Patton avenue by reason of the Asheville Street Railway company's paving work, and made a motion, which was adopted, that the Board issue a peremptory order to the company to put all of the debris from the excavation on the north side of the street. The chief of police was instructed to give the order, and, if it was not obeyed, have the work done at

the company's expense.
Alderman Gudger moved that the city engineer and joint street committee es-tablish the grade of South French Broad avenue, and that a grading force be put there at once. Adopted. Ouly 24 Days Yet.

Alderman Starnes hoped the Board would soon begin to think of paving giate institute. more streets, so that the city might not lose all of next summer. A discussion followed, during which Mayo: Blanton stated that the city had only a combo of months in which to dispose of the city bonds.
