SILVER CONFERENCE.

Democrats Trying to Get Together on the Question.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Representative Livingston of Georgia is preparing a bill on the lines of an understanding reached yesterday at a conference between Senator Carlisle and seventeen Democratic members of the House, representing the various elements, except the Radical free coinage men, of the party on the silver question. Among those present were Livingston and Turner, Georgia; Cox, Tenn.; Breckinridge, Ky.; Breckinridge, Ark.; Bynum, Ind.; Clark and Oates, Ala.; Bacon, New York; Tracy, Williams and Andrews, of Mass. and Brawley, South Carolina, Cox, of Tennessee and Livingston, of Georgia, have heretofore voted steadily with the free coinage men, and most of the southern men present here, as a rule, voted rather reluctantly with the silver men on most propositions. This "understanding" reached for the present what it could not be called a "definite agreement"—was to suspend the silver purchases, to reserve sufficient silver to provide for the redemption of outstanding notes issued in payment of silver purchases, and to coin at the rate of three million per month the silver representing the profit or difference between the purchase price and the coin value of the silver purchased. After this is done, silver purchases are to be resumed unless there is new legislation meanwhile.

WHERE'S NEWMAN?

The Queen's Envoy Does Not Keep His Engagements.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—The following telegram from Minister Stevens at Honolulu, received Saturday last, is made public today: "Affairs of State continue to be hopeful. Hoisting the flag in protection of this government was expected. Subjects who were doubtful are now for annexation. Natives show unexpected regard for the United States flag. The prudent conduct of Capt. Wiltsie and crew, of the Boston is a credit to the navy."

Up to the hour of the meeting of the cabinet today Paul Newman, the Queen's envoy to the United States had not called at the State department to see Secretary Foster, and the latter had received no explanation from him of his failure to keep the engagement made for last night. Inquiry at the hotel for Newman was met by the statement that he was not in.

HISTORIC STAIRWAY

It Came From Egypt and Is of Solid Marble.

The New York Herald of Sunday contains the following item of interest to Asheville people: "The center Richmond of the Old Dominion line, which sailed yesterday for Portsmouth, Va., carried a historic stairway which is to be placed in the new post office building by George W. Vanderbilt at Baltimore, near Asheville, N. C.

"This stairway is very wide, and is of solid marble. It has been stored in the vaults of the Lincoln Safe Deposit company since 1889. It is handsomely ornamented with sphinx's heads and other Egyptian figures. It was bought by Mr. Vanderbilt in Egypt, and was formerly the stairway in the palace of one of the Egyptian princes. It was brought from Egypt to this country four years ago."

The resolution he wished passed, he says, had been passed, although not exactly in that shape, by the Board here. It was only in order to get the resolution in such shape as to suit all parties concerned, and no threat whatever was intended toward the Board.

After Lewellyn and Pattilo.

Information has been received here that Lewellyn and Pattilo, two of the men wounded in the assault upon Deputy Marshal Brooks last week, were improving and would soon be well enough to move. Deputy Sheriff J. M. Morgan and F. M. Jones left for Ivy this afternoon and will bring Lewellyn and Pattilo to the Asheville jail. It is said that relatives of the wounded men say they shall not be brought to jail.

Murderous Muskrat Caught.

Deputy Sheriff John Everett, of Swain county, passed through Asheville yesterday on his way to the Indian Territory, having in charge John Muskrat, a Cherokee Indian captured on the reservation in Swain county. Muskrat is charged with having murdered another Indian in the Territory about two years ago and has been hiding in Swain county for about six months.
