

BUD WHITTEMORE IN JAIL

BROUGHT HERE BY OFFICERS LAST NIGHT.

The Evidence Before the Coroner Showed That the First Shot Fired by "Bud" Accidentally Struck His Father.

Coroner L. B. McBrayer, Sheriff Brookshire and Deputy Sheriff Morgan returned last night from Barnardsville, bringing with them "Bud" Whittemore, who took part in the killing at Barnardsville Saturday. Whittemore was lodged in jail.

Coroner McBrayer had the body of "Bud" Whittemore exhumed and made a post mortem examination, and held an inquest. The verdict of the jury was that J. H. Roberts had committed the death from a pistol shot wound at the hands of "Bud" Whittemore and that "Bud" had come to his death from an accidental shot at the hands of "Bud" Whittemore, and a shot at the hands of J. H. Roberts, and that the shot fired by Roberts was justifiable.
