## THE WARD CONVENTIONS

A MEETING OF DEMOCRATS LAST EVENING.

For Aldermen in the Four Wards D. D. Suttle, E. Baird, W. V. Low and W. L. Walker are suggested to Saturday's Primary.

The ward conventions are over.

They were held last evening and, while not fully attended by any means, brought out a crowd sufficiently large to make things interesting.

To the result, it is said, Mayor Blanton is reconciled. While not a candidate himself, in any sense, he has said all along that he had a keen interest in the Aldermen.

The nominations, it is believed in many quarters, partially fixes the "slate" for the city offices, if the ticket nominated is chosen at next Saturday's primary. This slate, it is believed, will be as follows: City attorney, T. H. Cobb; tax collector, N. A. Reynolds; chief of police, W. J. Hough.

First Ward, D. D. Suttle.

The Democratic vote in the First ward is not a very large one, consequently the attendance in the court house was rather small. The two candidates for Alderman, D. D. Suttle and Chas. A. Webb, were there. The convention organized by electing N. T. Penningman chairman and E. H. Wright secretary.

When nominations were called, H. A. Gudger said he had to propose for First ward Alderman the name of a young man of considerable experience, of intelligence and integrity, and a character that was blameless. He referred to Chas. A. Webb, esq.

Maj. John Edwin nominated D. D. Suttle, and there being no other nominations the vote was taken. While this was being done there was considerable talk as to whether the reconvening of the convention would be final. W. W. Jones, esq., said he didn't consider the convention as final, and would go to the primary and vote for another candidate than the one chosen if he so desired.

The vote was then counted, and Mr. Suttle was found to have received 35 votes, while Mr. Webb had 12.

For the office of Alderman-at-large the convention's 47 votes were cast for W. J. Hough and J. M. Westall.

Chas. A. Webb was nominated advisor for the First ward, and W. W. Jones said that he might want, when he came to the primary, to vote for Mr. Webb for Alderman and Mr. Suttle for a visitor, and would do so if he cared to.

The naming of two advisors for the city at large was left to the Democratic and Republican executive committees as the convention thought it advisable to have a Republican representation on the Advisory committee.

For members of the executive committee the ward chose D. M. Luther, H. C. Jones and E. H. Wright.

Mr. Suttle was called on and made a short speech. Mr. Webb was also called on but had left the room and was not found in time to speak. H. A. Gudger talked a little while, expressing a wish to see confidence for the ward, and named a regular Democratic Waterloo at the coming election.

Second Ward, Elisha Baird.

In the second ward convention J. D. Murphy, esq., was made chairman and W. F. Randolph secretary.

J. E. Rankin, W. A. Blair and R. J. Stokely were appointed a committee to suggest three names of an executive committee for the ward and they reported J. H. Tucker, H. C. Fagg and W. F. Randolph.

E. Baird, I. M. Westall and Judge H. B. Carter were nominated for the position of ward member of the Advisory committee. Mr. Rankin and Judge Carter declined and Mr. Westall's nomination was made by acclamation.

For two members of Advisory committee at large Messrs. C. E. Graham, W. W. Barnard, W. W. West, R. L. Fitzpatrick and E. E. Dickerson were named. Mr. Graham and Mr. Barnard declined and the vote resulted, West, 68; Fitzpatrick, 57, and Dickerson, 39.

The nominations for Alderman were J. Baird, W. F. Randolph, W. B. Williamson, J. E. Rankin, D. C. Waddell, Dr. G. W. Pardee and C. E. Graham. The names of all but the two first were withdrawn and the ballot stood: Baird 61, Randolph 38.

Third Ward, W. V. Low.

The Third ward convention was organized by electing T. R. Ransom chairman and the members of the press present secretaries.

The first business was the selection of three members of the Democratic executive committee for the ward. G. S. Powell, C. C. McCarty and E. L. Henry were chosen.

The selection of a nominee for Alderman was the next business. W. V. Low, A. D. Cooper, J. B. Cole and V. T. Belote were put in nomination. The vote was by ballot. One hundred votes were cast as follows: W. V. Low, 57; A. D. Cooper, 34; J. B. Cole, 6; V. T. Belote, 1; scattering, 2. W. V. Low was declared the nominee.

At Advisor for the Third ward, C. C. McCarty, A. D. Cooper and C. H. Campbell were put in nomination. The vote was by ballot. Eighty-six votes were cast as follows: C. C. McCarty, 44; A. D. Cooper, 37; C. H. Campbell, 4; scattering, 1.

A. D. Cooper and W. B. Gwyn were recommended as Advisors-at-large by acclamation.

Fourth Ward, W. L. Walker.

The Fourth ward convention was organized by the selection of W. B. Gwyn chairman and T. V. Terrell secretary.

W. L. Walker, W. B. Gwyn and W. F. Snider were placed in nomination for Aldermen. W. L. Walker was selected, having received 73 out of 85 votes.

For Advisor, W. B. Gwyn was nominated by acclamation.

W. J. Hough and Thos. D. Johnston were nominated for position of Alderman-at-large.

E. Stickleather, J. M. Green, H. Redwood, B. H. Cosby, I. M. Gudger, W. F. Snider and T. V. Terrell were nominated as Advisors-at-large. Messrs. Redwood and Green received the highest vote and were declared the convention's choice.

As members of the executive committee J. M. Gudger, Jr., E. Carter and Dr. G. A. Mebane were selected.

The Aldermen Named.

D. D. Suttle, the choice of the First ward, has been a resident of Asheville for several years, but is a native of Cleveland county. He is the proprietor of Suttle's mineral spring, just east of Beaumont.

Elisha Baird, who was named in the Second ward, is a Buncombe man, a large property owner, and at present a member of the Board of Aldermen.

W. V. Low, the choice of the Third ward, is comparatively a young man, and although not a native of Asheville has lived here a number of years. He holds the position of foreman of motive power of the Western North Carolina Railroad.

W. L. Walker, the Fourth ward's choice, is a young man and came here from Durham a few years ago. He is a tobacco buyer on the Asheville market.

Mr. Cooper Declines.

While I appreciate the confidence bestowed upon me by the Third ward, primary last night in endorsing me for Advisory committee "at-large" and, thinking my friends kindly for their support, I am compelled to withdraw my name and will not be a candidate before the primary next Saturday. Respectfully, A. D. Cooper.

SENATE STILL IN SESSION

THE ROACH CASE STILL UPPERMOST WITH REPUBLICANS.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Although confidently expected by the Senators at the close of yesterday's session that they would be able to adjourn sine die today, the prospects of reaching the end were not so bright this morning. The judicial nominations sent in yesterday will be reported to the Senate today from the judiciary committee which approved them all at the meeting this morning, but a single objection to any one of them would prevent confirmation today and send them over until Monday. Other matters of business are in the same position and consequently the question of adjournment today lies entirely within the decision of individual Senators, which materially reduces the chances of winding up the business of the session today. The President sent in a few minor appointments.

Senator Platt having the floor on the subject of the proposed investigation of Senator Roach, of North Dakota, notice was given by Harris that as soon as Platt should have closed his remarks he would move to take up a resolution for the appointment of a committee to wait upon the President and inquire whether he had any further communication to the Senate. Platt stated the fact that the Roach case and argued against the views presented yesterday by Senators George and Voorhees. He conceived that the duty of the Senate was plain. Could it be, he asked, that a convicted criminal, just discharged from the penitentiary, were elected Senator by a State the Senate had no power to reject or impeach him?

## SNOW AWAY OUT OF DATE

SOMETHING VERY LIKE A BLIZZARD NORTH.

A Deal Too Much Wind and a Liberal Dose of "The Beautiful"—Street Car Travel Impeded in Cleveland, O.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Snow has been falling fast in the middle section of the State since midnight. At Rochester there is a snow with a heavy, strong wind blowing. At 1 o'clock about five inches of snow had fallen and it is still snowing hard.

CLEVELAND, O., April 15.—A heavy and blinding snow storm has prevailed throughout northwestern Ohio since early last evening. This morning the snow has reached a depth of six inches and it is still falling. In this city street car traffic is impeded to some extent.

GLENN ON THE GROUND.

Now Where's Elias?—New Postmasters—Figuring.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., April 15.—[Special.]—The Observer's Washington special says:

In the figuring on what North Carolina will get in the foreign branch of the service, it is said that the State will not be entitled to more than \$22,000 per annum. As out of that the salary of Minister Alexander is to be paid, it is seen that either another mission or a consular generalship or a high grade consularship would nearly exhaust the quota, and in consequence those who want consulates and do not expect a very big one are anxious to have several smaller ones given rather than anything considerable. Of course those desiring an important place think otherwise.

AT HAMPTON ROADS.

Looking for the Italian and French Vessels.

PORT MONROE, Va., April 15.—Admiral Gherardi expects the British fleet to arrive early in the morning to be followed next day by the Italian ships and possibly the French and Brazilian vessels. The Russian may drop in at any moment. A stiff northwestern wind was blowing this morning with the surf lashing the shore and the waves high enough to toss the steam launches about in a reckless manner. Later the dark clouds in the east broke away and the sun shone warmly and the wind moderated to a gentle breeze.

At 10 o'clock Inspector General Breckenridge made an official call on Admiral Gherardi. The chief attraction today would be a large race between the crews of the San Francisco and Chicago, or the Pacific against the Atlantic ocean, these barges holding the championship in their respective waters.

A Party of Notables.

NEW YORK, April 15.—The steamship New York from Southampton with Duke DeVoraqua and party on board, arrived at quarantine shortly after 6 this morning. A drizzling rain was falling and the vessel was hidden in the fog. Commander Francis W. Dickinson, U. S. N., representing the federal government, boarded the New York, delivered an address of welcome in Spanish to which the Duke replied. The party was then transferred to the steamer Blackbird which brought them to this city.

A \$12,000 Fire in North Carolina.

RALEIGH, N. C., April 15.—Fire at Williamston, N. C., yesterday broke out in the building occupied by G. Goddard, general merchant. It quickly spread, consuming the building occupied by B. B. Watts, general merchandise. Loss about \$12,000; partly covered by insurance.

She Worked on Sunday.

COLUMBIA, S. C., April 15.—The Charleston presbytery in session here has confirmed the action of the Second Presbyterian church at this city in suspending Miss Means, a member who engaged in the telephone exchange on Sunday.

"The Columbus Caravels."

HAVANA, April 15.—The Columbus caravels, Santa Maria, Nina and Pinta, sailed hence for the United States today. They will take a prominent part in the great naval review to be held at New York.

Charged With Murder.

PARIS, April 15.—A man named Duprat and a woman named Desmalle were arrested today on suspicion of having caused the explosion last November when five persons were killed.

Dropped Dead.

CAMDEN, N. J., April 15.—Hon. Thos. H. Dudley, ex-consul to Liverpool, dropped dead at Broad street station, Philadelphia, this morning.

Hanged.

CAMDEN, April 14.—John Hill, colored, was hanged here this morning for the murder of Joseph Dodson, also colored, last October.
