—Few local option elections are to be held this year. The first Monday in June is the date.

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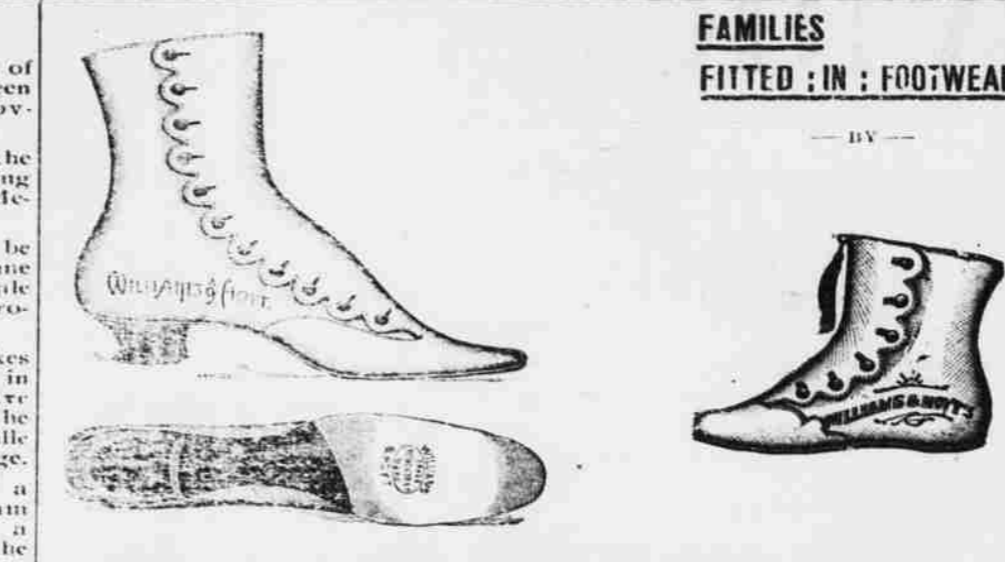

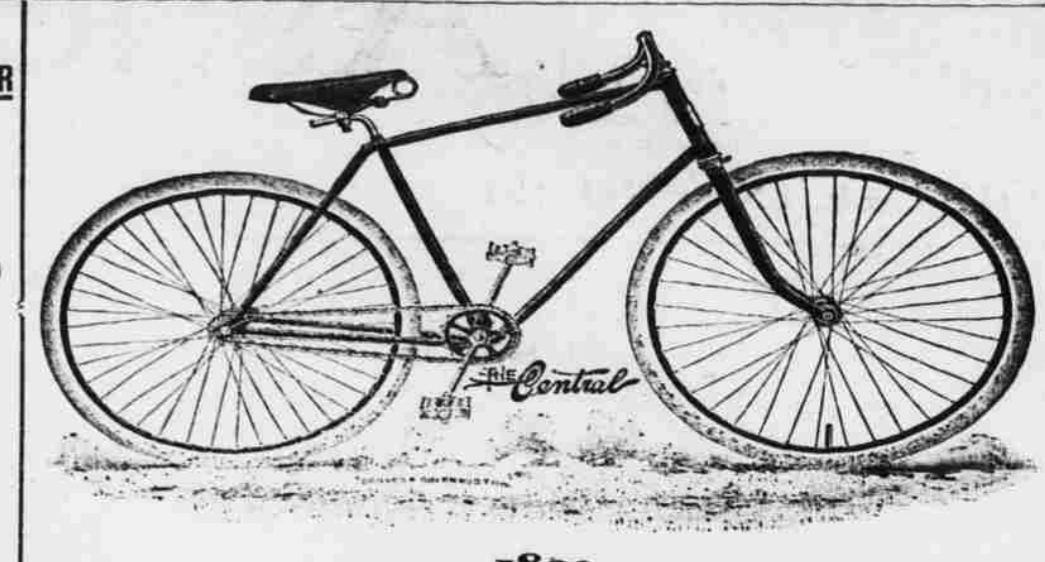
