> The Superintendent of Ashe ville's Schools Will Take the Chair of Pedagogy and German at the State Normal School.

Superintendent P. P. Claxton, of the graded schools, has decided finally that he will leave Asheville, his mind having been made up since vesterday, when THE CITIZEN stated that he would remain here. Prof. Claxton gave his resigna Nature's Product! tion to the school committee today, to take effect on the first of July.

Prof. Cuxton gives up his place here which he has held for several years, to take the chair of pedagogy and German in the State Normal school at Greensboro. While the salary will be the same as he received here, \$1,800, he believes he will be in position to do a greater work for the cause of education in his iew chair.

Geo. T. Pullaskie Out in Th Cold.

WASHINGTON, June 20 .-- Judge Bradley this morning rendered a decision refusing writ of mandamus to Geo. T. Pullaskie to compel the civil service commission to approve his reinstatement as a substitute letter carrier.

Pullaskie passed the civil service examination for the position and, August, 1892, his name was placed on the eligible list for appointment. January 23, 1893, Postmaster Sherwood of Washington made a requisition upon the civil service commission for a candidate for appointment. This list as forwarded included Pullaskie's name and he was selected and received notice from the postmaster of his appointment. He was dropped from the rolls by direction of he postmaster general under instruc-ions of the civil service commission that the appointment was irregular. Pullaskis contended that he was un

ta wfully removed from the position and appiled for a writ of mandamus to compel the postmaster general to reinstate him, the commission to approve the re-

Judge Brad ey in his opinion, discussed in detail the civil service law and points made by the petitioner, and reached the onclusion that it was apparent from be facts in the case that Pulaski, having been irregularly appointed, had no such absolute legal right to theoffice in which he was placed, as that would justify the court in interfering. The court therefore cfused the writ prayed for.

A Great Conspirácy to Smuggle Chinese and Opinm.

Washington, June 20.-Patrick H. Winston, United States attorney; Thos. R. Brown, United States marshal; Aufrew Wasson, United States collector at Port Townsend; C. J. Mulkey, United States special agent, and six special inspectors of customs in the Puget Sound district, all in the State of Washington, have been dismissed as a result of reports made to Secretary Carlisle by special treasury agents Wood and Lewis. The officials removed are charged with being onnected with one of the most extensive and successful conspiracies ever formed to smugele Chinese and opium into the United States across the far northwest erritory.

FORD'STHEATER DISASTER

AINSWORTH, DANT AND SASSI HELLED.

The Government Censured Fo Not Having a Skilled Superin tendent in Charge of The Worl Under The Theater Building.

WASHINGTON, June 20 .- The coroner's jury investigating the Ford's theater dis aster has brought in a verdict holding Col. F. C. Ainsworth, Contractor Georg W. Dant, Superintendent Covert and En gineer Sasse responsible for the death of the victims, by reason of criminal neg ligence on their part.

The jury add: "We do further say that the failure of the government of the United States to provide for skilled superintendence of the work of repair and alteration of its buildings in charge of the War Department is most unbusi nesslike and reprehensible and we are of he opinion that if such superintendence had been provided in the case of work on Ford's theater building the awful tragedy night have been averted."
No warrants were served this morning

on the defendants, but Col. F. C. Ainsworth, Wm E. Covert, superintendent of the theater building, and Francis Sasser, its engineer, appeared voluntarily in the Criminal court before Judge McComas and gave bail in the sum of \$10,000 each for their appearance.


