

that the tide in gold exports from this country to Europe has turned.

During the months beginning July 1, 1892, and ended May 31, 1893, the balance of gold against the United States was \$85,000,000.

For the past three weeks no gold has been exported from New. York to Europe, and the Treasury department has been gaining gold daring that period—the net—gold balance today standing at \$94,050,310. In the building up of this gold, the Treasury department has redeemed near \$6,000,000 of gold certificates, the amount outstanding today being \$98,070,000, against \$104,000,000 on the first of June, While the receipts and expenditures of the Treasure department. While the receipts and expenditures of the Treasury department have kept neck and neck during the month, it is stated that the balance today is \$26,420,415. Of this amount \$12, 253,000 is in sub-sidiary silver and minor coin and \$11,-921,000 in the national bank depositors. This shows that the treasury is pro-vided with a good working currency

KILLED BY A CYCLONE

THE DEAD WERE TERRIBLY

MANGELED. Another Tragedy in That Cave of the Winds, Kansas Missouri Also Heard From in the Same

PERRY, Kan., June 22 .- A most detructive eyclone passed through Wilamston and the surrounding country in Jefferson county about seven o'clock last night. It travelled southeast and traversed a space a ball mile wide and about six miles long. In that area not a house, barn or tree is left standing.

The cyclone was accompanied by errible rainstorm and almost midnight darkness. Eleven dead bodies have so far been discovered and it is known that at least five more persons were killed. The dead are: L. F. Evans and Emory

Evans, Mrs. Jno, Hutchison, Sam L Kincaide, Cora Kincaide, Sadie Kincaide, Walter Kincaide, Eva Kincaide Wm. Kincaide and Sam Stewart. Their bodies were all horribly mangled. Mrs. Hutchinson's arms and limbs were found in a tree a mile from the house. Eva Kincaide's head was severed from her body. Three persons are known to be fatally injured and many others were

fatally injured and many others were seriously injured.

Probably at least 20 persons were killed and 30 houses blown down.

Sr. Joseph, Mo., June 22.—News has reached this city of a cyclone at Conception, Mo., 60 miles north of here. The house of John Doyle was blown down and Doyle and his wife and an old man were killed, the latter being decapitated. A solid front wall of the abbey of New Engleberg, being erected by the Benedictine monks, was blown down and 10.000 feet of brick wall tumbled inside the structure. Torrents of rain completed the destruction of the edifice. Houses and barns were blown down, and a number of people hurt. The Omaha and St. Louis railroad depot was unroofed.
