British newspaper comment on the Victoria incident, while admitting that Admiral Tryon blundered in giving orders, criticise the action of other officers in obeying, when a rule of the navy provides that the order of a superior need not be obeyed when it is certain to result in collision. The mining camps of Silver City and Delamar, Idaho, which have been the most prosperous in this State, are not seriously affected by the decline in the price of silver owing to the fact that a large portion of the product of the mines is gold. The question of the citizenship of Gov. John P. Altgeld, of Illinois, who pardoned the anarchists, having been raised a search of the records was made, showing that his father was naturalized when the Governor was a baby. T. J. The greatest business was done in 1890-'91, \$454,000; it being \$339,000 for 1892-'93.
