ELECTIONS BY THE ALDERMEN

A. Rankin and Dr. John H. Williams Chosen To Succeed Messrs. Gaudger and Millard—Other Business of Two Boards.

The Joint Board met yesterday afternoon at 4:20, just one hour and 20 minutes late. A wait for a quorum was the cause of the delay.

The reports of assessments for paving on North Main, Haywood, Buxton, Roberts, Willow and Church streets, and Merrimon and Patton avenues, made out by City Engineer Lee, were adopted.

The street and finance committees recommended brick for the Church street sidewalk as follows: On the east side from the Soudley building to Willow street, and on the west side from Patton avenue to the northeast corner of Central church lot.

The following bills were ordered paid: \$108.11; J. A. Murdoch, \$7.50; Pennington Bros., \$25.75; street payroll, \$297.45; Corn & Trow, \$405.92; Brown, Northrup & Co., \$7.05; J. E. Dickerson & Co., \$2.20; Govan Pressley, \$50; W. H. Westall, \$60.47.

When the Aldermen came to order the Mayor read a communication from Cobb & Merrimon in which that firm declined to appear as counsel for the city in the damage suit in which the city is defendant and Mrs. Jordan plaintiff.

Chas. M. Stedman, one of the city's counsel in this case, had something to say privately to the Board in connection with the suit, and Aldermen Jones and Stedman left the room.
