Report of Assessments Against Each Property Owner, as Made out by City Engineer Lee and Adopted by the Boards.

The assessments against property owners on Depot street, for their share of the expense of paving, are printed today, being taken from the report of City Engineer Lee to the Joint Board and Board of Aldermen and by these bodies adopted.

In making up the reports the damages paid to property owners for land taken, and for the cost of the paving, are printed together with the cost of paving, so that the property owners can see at a glance whether the cost of paving, so far as it is to be made up and sent to the Supreme court in order to have this point settled.
