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YELLOW FEVER PROGRESS

NO NEW CASES IN BRUNSWICK, GA.

But the People Are Leaving the Town Just the Same—Florida's Quarantine—Asheville Will Welcome the Refugees

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—At the request of the State health officer of Florida, the Marine hospital service has stationed its inspectors at Waycross and Jessup, Ga., to prevent passengers and baggage from entering Florida unless they have a certificate of immunity signed by the proper Marine hospital officer at Brunswick.

Advices received from Dr. Porter at Tampa state that there are no new developments of yellow fever in that vicinity.

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WHAT CONGRESS IS DOING

THE DAY AT THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

Mr. Covert Pleads for Unconditional Repeal and Makes Comparison—Senator Peffer's Resolution.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The House met at 10 o'clock this morning and the silver debate was opened at once by C. W. Stone (Pa.) who spoke for repeal and abjured the members to disregard partisan feeling in dealing with this subject.

Covert (N. Y.) pleaded for unconditional repeal and, comparing silver to a faithful servant fallen into bad habits, held that nothing would suffice to restore it but the gold cure.

Fitch (N. Y.) followed in the same line.

Dalsell contended for the repeal of the purchase act of the Sherman bill and ascribed the difficulties of the present situation to democratic possibility to tariff.

Hatch, in speaking in favor of free coinage, advocated a caucus of Democrats of the House and Senate to interpret the Chicago platform, every man of whom would pledge his life, fortune and his sacred honor to abide by the decision.

The new committee on ways and means held its first meeting this morning. All the members were present. Chairman Wilson was authorized to appoint sub-committees, a clerk and other employees. Tuesdays and Fridays were fixed as the regular meeting days. Chairman Wilson requested the members to consider before the next meeting a plan of procedure for the committee in its work; whether or not hearings should be given persons interested in the tariff, and how and when a bill should be reported.

Among bills introduced in the Senate this morning was one by Pasco as a substitute for the minority bill of the Finance committee. Pasco's bill proposes silver coinage at a ratio of 20 to 1, and a commission of three citizens of the United States to ascertain and report before January 1894, on the intrinsic relative value of gold and silver, and that on that report the Secretary of the Treasury shall fix and determine the ratio.

A resolution was offered yesterday by Peffer inquiring of the Secretary of the Treasury as to the conduct of national banks in refusing to pay promptly in currency the checks of their depositors. This was taken up and a motion to refer it to the finance committee was made by Hoar who said that in a time of popular distress and panic the comptroller of the currency should not be compelled to drive national banks up to the street corner of the law. Voorhees favored the reference of the resolution, Manderson, Kyle and Hill opposed it and insisted on the adoption of the resolution.

CONFIDENCE RETURNING.

The Financial Situation Changing For The Better.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Viewed from the treasury standpoint, the general financial situation of the country shows an improvement, slightly perhaps, but it is believed the permanent bank failures have almost entirely ceased; the banks that suspended are resuming business; the gold which poured out of the country is returning, and a general feeling of confidence is being restored.

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 23.—Clark's thread mills, which have been shut down for the past three weeks, resumed operation this morning on three-quarters time.

Quarantine Against Russia.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 23.—Owing to the prevalence of cholera in Russia the Turkish government has ordered five days quarantine against all vessels arriving from Russian ports.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Surgeon General Wyman today received a cable from the office at Antwerp stating that the new cholera cases there average two daily.

ROTTERDAM, Aug. 23.—Two cases of cholera and one death from the disease have occurred in this city.

Presidential Nominations.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The President today sent to the Senate the nomination of Josiah Dodge of Wisconsin, to be Assistant Attorney General, vice Wm. A. Maury resigned.

The Duke Is Dead.

BERLIN, Aug. 23.—Duke Ernest of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha died at midnight at his castle at Reinhardsbrunn in Coburg.

NEWS IN OUR OWN STATE.

—The next session of the university will open Thursday, September 7. Tuesday and Wednesday, September 5 and 6, will be devoted to registration and the allotment of rooms. Lectures will begin Thursday. President Winston has had over 1,000 letters during the summer, and the prospects are fine for a large attendance.

—Mr. Waddington, of Alamance, whose arm was broken recently by being hit by a cow tossed from the track by an engine, is going to sue the Seaboard Air Line for \$5,000. He says the cow, when she had regained consciousness and when he had not, dragged him down to the creek and nearly drowned him.

—The State geologist has received information that valuable sapphire polishing materials have been discovered in Jackson county. A company has been organized to work it, and one hundred and thirty-five men are at work. The material is said to be worth ten cents per pound.

—Mr. Arthur Prempert fired at the wrong window when a burglar was in his house in Wilmington Saturday morning, and a burglar tore a blind off the other window in his haste.

—The Rockingham Spirit of the South has a friend who tells it cannot oysters will cure hog cholera in its worst form. It takes about a one-pound can to do the work.

—Gov. Carr has offered \$200 reward for Jack Nicholson, a white man who killed his own brother in Jackson county recently.

—Gov. Carr has appointed a special term of events in India that would induce it to interfere with the single money standard.

UNLUCKY RIDE.

Down an Incline on a Runaway Load of Wood.

Yesterday afternoon two little sons of Carter Penland, living off Patton avenue between French Broad avenue and Ann street, climbed on a wagon loaded with wood that was standing in the yard where the team had been unhitched. The boys worked with the brake until it was taken off and the wagon at once rolled down the incline and over an embankment eight feet high.

One of the boys was thrown some distance, while the other was buried under wood and wagon and it required several minutes to get him out of the dangerous position. He was found to be severely injured. His jaw was broken in four places and he was otherwise bruised. Drs. John H. Williams and J. A. Watson were called in and gave all possible attention to the sufferer. It is feared that there was concussion of the brain.

ITALY SCARED.

She Is Hastening To Move On A French Inquiry.

ROME, Aug. 23.—The Italian government is taking steps to punish those officials who are held responsible for not preventing rioting in this city. The attempt Sunday night by a mob to burn the French embassy in this city has opened the eyes of the government more fully to the fact that grave international complications were more than likely to grow out of the disturbances.

Tuesday Signor Giolitti, prime minister, issued a decree ordering the suspension from office of Senator Galenda, prefect of Rome; Signor Sandry, Chief of Police, and Signor Magnetti, Inspector of Police in the district in which the French embassy is situated. The decree states that the suspension of the three officials is due to their failure to maintain order.

Signor Giolitti has also appointed a committee of inquiry to determine who is answerable for failure to carry out the instructions in regard to rioting given by the ministers.

ONCE MORE DEFEAT.

Walker Pitched a Good Game, But Wasn't Supported.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 23.—[Special.]—It's the same story that Asheville has to listen to, and when the Highlanders wound up the game yesterday afternoon they were stared in the face by this score: Knoxville, 16; Asheville, 8. The game was lost through errors in the field and wild throwing. Knoxville got 7 hits and made 7 errors, while Asheville made 13 hits and 11 errors.

Walker pitched a good game. The Knoxvilleers are particularly good fielders but weak at the bat.

The features of the game were a three-batter to deep center by Riet and a similar performance by Garrison along the first base line. Asheville did stupid base-running, Knoxville making a triple play on a pop-up fly to short center.

A material change in the players' positions is contemplated for today, and the Asheville have strong hopes of winning the third game.

To Engraft Skin on a Burned Girl.

SPRINGFIELD, O., Aug. 20.—From each of the 25 members of the Red Cross Society a small piece of cuticle will be taken which will be grafted on Minnie Yeager of this city, a member of the order, who was so seriously burned two weeks ago by a gasoline explosion that on parts of her body every particle of the skin perched off.

Cable Car Victims.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Representative Shell of South Carolina who was struck and badly bruised by a cable car Monday night is doing very well. His injuries, though painful, are not serious. Representative Oates of Alabama continues to improve, but his physicians will not allow him to leave his bed.

LONDON, August 23.—In the House of Commons Sir William Vernon Harcourt, chancellor of the exchequer, said that the Government had found nothing in the course of events in India that would induce it to interfere with the single money standard.
