Courts in the county have been suspended until October. Eleven coaches of refugees left yesterday. It is now 14 days since the first case was developed. There has been but one other case. Harris, the sick man, is resting easy.

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 23.—Atlanta wel-comes all refugees from the yellow fever districts. Several thousand are already here and so far no suspicious cases have developed. The disease has never taken footboold here and the people are not at all afraid of it.

Mr. Covert Pleads for Unconditional Repeal and Makesa Comparison-Senator Peffer's Resolution.

Washington, Aug. 23.-The House net at 10 o'clock this morning and the silver debate was opened at once by C W. Stone (Pa.,) who spoke for repeal and abjured the members to disregard partisan feeling in dealing with this sub-

Covert (N. Y.,) pleaded for unconditional repeal and, comparing silver to a faithful servant fallen into bad habits held that nothing would suffice to re-store it but the gold cure. Fitch (N. Y.,) followed in the same

Dalsell contended for the repeal of the purchase act of the Sherman bill and asribed the difficulties of the present situ ation to democratic posibility to tariff. The new committee on ways and means held its first meeting this morn ing. All the members were present. Chairman Wilson was authorized to appoint sub-committees, a clerk and other employes. Tuesdays and Fridays were fixed as the regulr meeting days hairman Wilson requested the members to consider before the next meeting a plan of procedure for the committee in its work; whether or not hearings shall be given persons interested in the tariff, and how and when a bill shall be reported.

Among bills introduced in the Senate this morning was one by Pasco as a substitute for the minority bill of the Finance committee. Pasco's bill proposes silver coinage at a ratio of 20 to 1, and a commission of three citizens of the United States to ascertain and report before January 1894, on the intrinsic relative value of gold and silver, and that on that report the Secretary and that on that report the Secretary of the Treasury shall fix and determine the ratio.

A resolution was offered yesterday by Peffer inquiring of the Secretary of the Treasury as to the conduct of national banks in refusing to pay promptly in eur-rency the checks of their depositors. This was taken up and a motion to refer it to the finance committee was made by Hoar who said that in a time of popu-lar distress and panic the comptroller of the currency should not be compelled to drive national banks up to the strict letter of the law. Voorhees favored the reference of the resolution, Manderson, Kyle and Hill opposed it and insisted on the adoption of the resolution.

CONFIDENCE RETURNING.
