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## SEND CHILDREN TO SCHOOL

SEND WORDS FROM PROF. P. P. CLAXTON

Prof. P. P. Claxton has received the following letter from Prof. P. P. Claxton of the State Normal school, Greensboro, but formerly superintendent of Asheville's schools, commenting upon an article written for The Citizen by Mail.

Westall recently: "I have just read your note in The Citizen of the 24th inst. Permit me to say that I hope you will agitate this matter until Asheville has some well devised law compelling parents to give their children the advantages offered by our schools. The citizens of the State have a right to demand that its future citizens shall not be permitted, through the greed or negligence of their parents, to grow up in ignorance and vice, thus becoming a burden and a menace. It is the duty of the city and of the State to protect the helpless child against the influence of such parents, and to impose upon their children, robbing them of their best heritage, the right to be educated and trained during their youth for the service of the community."

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## A COLORED CONVENTION

IS CONSIDERING AN IMPORTANT QUESTION

Bishop Taylor Would Have The Negro Race Go Back To Africa In Part-Special Statute For Emigrants.

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 29.—Bishop H. M. Turner of Atlanta, Ga., called to order yesterday the National Colored convention. The list of delegates reached over 500. W. H. Council of Jointville, Ala., was made temporary chairman and J. H. Willis of Michigan was chosen as secretary. Permanent organization was effected by the election of Bishop H. M. Turner president.

J. C. Taylor of Kansas City, Kansas, recently appointed United States minister to Bolivia, made an address taking strong ground against all mob laws in general. His remedy was the enactment of a special statute for the speedy trial of all rapists, fixing the punishment at death. He wanted also to compel the county in which a man was lynched to pay his heirs \$10,000.

At night Bishop Turner delivered an address, carefully prepared and full of deep feeling. He deplored the appointment upon the race, and declared that if even half that was charged against the colored men of the United States is true, colored men themselves should band together and organize for the correction of the evil by the most radical measures. The bishop's remedy is in part African emigration. He favors calling on his nation for a portion of the forty million which the country owes the colored race for daily labor, say five hundred million dollars, to enable them to begin African emigration.

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
