SLIGHT TOUCH OF CLIMATE

ASHEVILLE HAS SOME UNUSUAL WEATHER

SHOW AND SLEET SUNDAY. WITH MORE SNOW SUNDAY NIGHT—STREET CAR TRAFFIC IMPEDED AND SOME TRAINS LATE.
THE CITIZEN'S Washington forecast Saturday afternoon predicted snow. The people of Asheville are prepared to testify to the absolute correctness of the prognostication.
Snow began falling here early Saturday evening and when the people arose Sunday they looked out upon a bed of white that measured about four inches on a level. To this was added sleet, which fell the greater part of the day. This was accompanied by a stiff wind that, with the sleet, had a decidedly blizzardish feeling. Late in the afternoon snow began falling again and by this morning had added perhaps two inches to the stock on hand, making one of the heaviest snowfalls Asheville has experienced in several years.

Asheville yesterday had a foretaste of what the city would be without street car accommodations. Some of the cars on the Asheville street railroad ventured out about 9 o'clock. The Camp Patton car got as far as the Oaks hotel, then gave up and came in. It took up more time to get than it did going. The Lookout Mountain car did not make a trip. Communication was established between the square and the depot, but it took a shovel brigade until about noon to open the track. A car was also gotten out on Patton avenue, but its trips were infrequent. On the Montford avenue road a car started out, but 50 yards ploughing convinced the carmen that it was "no go" and the car was returned to the shed. The West Asheville and Sulphur Springs railway was also blocked. The uptown line of the latter road has been in operation today.

The snow gave sleighers a chance and some cutters were out yesterday afternoon. A number of sleighs were brought into service today.
Indications point to plenty of coasting on Flint street where young and old had so much amusement last winter. Several sleighs were brought out yesterday and employed in putting the slide in condition. This has been continued today and it is expected that by tonight there will be room and fun for a big crowd of merry coasters.

The Railroads.

Yesterday the track of the Western North Carolina road between Newton and Hickory and from Connelly Springs to Morganton was so badly drifted that the snow caked the ashpan of the locomotive and frequent stops were necessary to clean out for draught. The company ordered two engines to be sent to the Morganton tracks each train, and in this manner the tracks were cleared. The westbound did not get in until 10:45 last night. The A. & S. train, due last night, arrived at 5 o'clock this morning.

Give to the Flower Mission.

There is this winter, more or less destitution among the poor of Asheville, and this condition is of course aggravated by weather such as is now felt. Yesterday Mayor Patton, realizing the need for help in the more pronounced cases, instructed the police to report such cases as should be attended to at once. A number have been reported and in these the city has furnished coal in small quantities. Those of Asheville's people who are inclined to give of their funds to relieve such cases as may be found worthy of help are urged to take or send contributions to the Flower Mission central office, on the second floor of the City Hall. The Mission, because of its admirable ward system, is kept informed on all cases of destitution, and funds given to the Mission are sure to be judiciously applied to relief of those who are needy. THE CITIZEN is sure that the charitable people of Asheville will not require a second appeal.

FAR WORSE THAN HERE.

Mercury Down Out of Sight and Snow All Over Everything.
NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—On account of the sleet storm the telegraph service is very badly crippled, especially north of Washington.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 26.—The worst blizzard in a decade has prevailed throughout Alabama for two days. Rain, hail and snow fell in succession all heavily today, and as a result every fruit crop is believed to be cut short 50 per cent. There is much suffering among the poorer classes.

A NOTABLE CASE.

B. F. Howard Appeals to the United States Supreme Court.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—B. F. Howard, convicted last October in the Circuit Court of the United States for the Western district of Tennessee for violation of the postal laws has appealed to the Supreme Court of the United States, the case being docketed today. Howard is charged with an extensive series of swindles as attorney for claimants to mythical English estates which was consistently bringing to the attention of his victims. Ex-Minister Lincoln and ex-Consul-General New were witnesses for the Government in the case.

McKane Goes To Sing Sing.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Feb. 26.—Judge Cullen this morning denied John Y. McKane's application for certificate of reasonable doubt.

SING SING, Feb. 26.—Matthew Johnson was electrocuted this morning for the murder of Emil Kuckelhorn, Dec. 9, 1892.

MORE OF DRAUGHN.

Where Was the Man Taken From Atlanta?

Dispatches sent out from Atlanta concerning David D. Draughn, the man who was in Grady hospital, Atlanta, several weeks unable to remember his name, are conflicting. One says Draughn was sent to Winston, while another says he was taken to Murphy. Draughn, it is said, is a bigamist, having married in Winston, Asheville and Bryson City.

A telegram from Murphy to the Atlanta Constitution says the man was taken to Culberson, near Murphy, where he was recognized as Dr. J. D. Heath, an Asheville and Bryson City. Heath is a herb doctor. Dr. Heath is known in Asheville as Dr. Reynolds. Dr. Reynolds is a member of the firm of Reynolds Bros. & Heath, D. L. Reynolds says he does not believe it is Dr. Heath, as the picture printed of the man in the hospital does not resemble the Doctor.

FROM WEAVERVILLE.

Marriages—Epworth League—Good Schools—The Farmers.
WEAVERVILLE, N. C., Feb. 17.—The year '94 was ushered in upon the quiet village of Weaverville with several matrimonial disturbances. The first was the marriage of Rev. H. C. Sprinkle to Miss Ellen Weaver. Miss Weaver had held for four years the position of clerk in the dry goods store of F. P. Roberts, a favorite with all the college pupils. Mrs. Sprinkle is now visiting friends for the first time since her marriage.

Summary Vengeance Visited Upon the Murderer of Two.

ELKIN, N. C., Feb. 24.—D. Slaughter, who murdered Bare and Long in Alleghany county a few weeks ago, were taken from jail at Sparta Thursday night by a mob and lynched. The jailer offered stubborn resistance and even shot one of the crime, but that did not stop them. The crime was a most brutal one and the general opinion of the community that he deserved hanging.—Charlotte Observer.

Bill Would Run for Governor.

AMSTERDAM, N. Y., Feb. 26.—Senator David B. Hill has written a private letter to the editor of the Morning Sentinel, saying that he was not and would not be gubernatorial nominee this year. At the same time he expressed his belief that Governor Flower would be renominated.

Counterfeiting Gang Arrested.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—The treasury department is informed that the secret service officers have arrested at Opelika the Stillmore gang of 13 persons for counterfeiting.

JUST IN NORTH CAROLINA.

—H. E. Satterfield, a married man living in Winston, eloped Friday with the beautiful 17 year old daughter of H. T. Shore of Salem. Officers are in pursuit. Satterfield was a partner in a beef market in Salem and when he left he carried all the money in the drawer. The couple were seen going toward Lexington.

—Mr. Charles Buford, chairman of the Forsyth county democratic executive committee, has issued a circular denouncing the editor of the Sentinel on account of criticisms and insinuations which have appeared in that paper.

—Saturday night the store of Mr. R. A. Tyson, located on his plantation, nine miles from Greenville, was destroyed by fire, together with almost the entire stock of goods. Loss \$2,000.

—William G. Crutfield, of Guilford college, and Paul Crutfield, of Winston, has made an assignment, making R. B. Glenn trustee. The liabilities aggregate \$6,352; assets not stated.

—News has been received of the failure of Frank Hart, general merchant at Tarboro. Liabilities \$10,000, and preferred debts about \$3,000.

—The receiver of the People's National bank of Fayetteville has this far paid 60 per cent to depositors. He will soon pay 10 per cent more.

—The boiler of the saw mill of J. F. Jordan at Gulf, Chatham county, exploded, killing the engineer and a man named Edwards.

—M. T. Wood, general merchant at Enfield, and Gunter & Co., grocers, at Weldon, have assigned.

NOW HE IS AFTER DUCKS

PRESIDENT CLEVELAND OUT IN THIS WEATHER.

He is Much Disgusted at the Action of The House in Starting a New Silver Agitation, and Flees From Washington.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—If any doubts have heretofore been entertained as to the President's attitude on the silver seigniorage question, these doubts seem to have been entirely removed by conversations had Sunday with the President just before his departure for North Carolina on a duck shooting trip. It is positively stated that one principal source of the ill-humor which led the President to seek relief in this trip in the face of a spell of unusually inclement and threatening weather, was the continued effort in the House to revive the silver agitation by the Bland bill for the coinage of the silver seigniorage.

From those who have recently spoken to the President on this subject this information is derived. When the bond issue was determined upon for the purpose of relieving the treasury from financial embarrassment, it was for the very purpose of avoiding the necessity for the coinage of the silver seigniorage. If the administration had seen its way clear to have raised as much money as by the bond issue without increasing the public debt or the annual interest thereon, but the money the President wanted was gold, not silver.

HATCH'S ANTI-OPTION BILL.

Now in the Hands of the Agricultural Committee.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—By a vote of yeas 107, nays 53, the house today agreed to discharge the committee on ways and means from further consideration of Hatch's anti-option bill and send it to the committee of agriculture for report.

Another "No Quorum"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—The Senate finance committee did not meet today, despite the notice sent out by the chairman and telegraphing for members who were out of the city. Promptly at 10 o'clock a number of members were present, but there was no quorum, and the matter went over until tomorrow.

Senator Vance Better.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—Chas. N. Vance has received a letter from his father, dated at Seawater, Fla., February 23, stating that the Senator is somewhat better than he has been since he went to Florida.

Early Holding His Own.

LYNCHBURG, Va., Feb. 26.—Gen. Early's physician says that the patient is holding his own.

CONDENSED TELEGRAMS.

In denying the statement that he was at all ill President Cleveland said Saturday: "I am forced to conclude that there is an epidemic of mendacity emanating from the dull and stupid brains of some of these correspondents." President Cleveland is now on the North Carolina coast duck shooting.

A Memphis telegram says: "The knights of labor of the United States are about to start upon a campaign having for its object the removal of the negroes from the United States and their colonization in the Congo basin, Liberia, or some other part of Africa."

Southern Congressmen bitterly denounced ex-Mayor Hewitt for the speech he made at the Southern Society dinner. One member called the address the "adumbration of a dyspeptic intellect," and another advised the ex-Mayor to go to the devil.

Henry McDonald, son of a leading Baptist minister of Atlanta, was arrested in Chattanooga Saturday in company with a woman not his wife.

Michigan's Republican attorney general, treasurer, secretary of state and land commissioner have been indicted for altering election returns.

Gen. Benj. W. Tracy's, Wiman's counsel, says the latter is not guilty of forgery as charged.

Prof. Phelps of New Haven is reported out of danger and improving slowly.

It is reported that Congressman Wilcox is ill with typhoid fever.
