JUST IN NORTH CAROLINA.

Representative Crawford learns that the Hendersonville postmaster will be settled this week. It is learned that the capacity of the Raleigh hosiery yarn mills, which now have 8,000 spindles, is to be doubled.

The Raleigh oil mills have closed the season's run, having handled 9,000 tons of seed, this being their best record by about 500 tons.

The Governor has appointed A. M. Waddell, solicitor of New Hanover criminal court, to fill the vacancy caused by Col. Ben R. Moore's death.

J. D. Pollard, the father of the now noted Madeline (of the Pollard-Breckinridge case), lived in Raleigh in 1872-74, and was in the insurance business.

Mr. James P. Ferrall, a prominent business man of Raleigh, is to be married at Demopolis, Alabama, on the 25th instant to Miss Webb, of that place.

The revenue collections in the Raleigh district for March were \$80,881.07. Of this \$17,521 was for cigars and cigarettes, \$13,327 for spirits, and \$49,033 for tobacco.

In Jones county Clay Kousser was paralyzed and died in the field. In Gaston county Cyrus Black, 83 years old, was also stricken with paralysis while planting corn and died in a quarter of an hour.

Miss Adelaide Gardner of Shelby, one of the brightest and most intellectual teachers in the State, has been awarded the prize for the best essay on spelling which was offered by the North Carolina Teachers.

Gov. Carr has laid before the Supreme court the question of the duration of the term of judges appointed to fill vacancies. The Governor wrote a letter to the court asking for a decision.

A Florida special says: W. A. Poston, a contractor, committed suicide by hanging this morning. The tragedy occurred in a closet of a house which Poston came from North Carolina and was married.

Senator Vanhook writes that Senator Vance wrote to him that the finance committee could do nothing with the Sumner matter and that he would wait for his attendance. Senator Jones tells the Washington correspondent of the Charlotte Observer that the committee has received no such communication from Senator Vance.

Mr. Rider said he was fully satisfied with the course pursued by the school authorities and only regretted that such exaggerated reports about the school had gone out to the world.

The Washington correspondent of the Richmond Dispatch says: Considerable fuss appears to have been made about a matter that turns out to have amounted to very little. It would now seem that the report that the Attorney General was about to lay down most tyrannical in breakers of internal revenue laws in North Carolina had very little foundation. MACADAMIZED ROADS.

A Supply Found of the Best Material. Editor THE CITIZEN:—On Saturday last with my friends Mr. R. S. Smith, Mr. Howard and Mr. Lowe of Biltmore, I made a trip by carriage over the Blue Ridge down Hickory Nut Gap to Esmeralda. After passing the ridge we found a marked difference in the climate (the temperature being much warmer) and thoroughly enjoyed the drive by the picturesque banks of Hickory Nut Creek.

About four miles from the ridge we came to Broad river, which we forded, and after a drive of two miles through some magnificent scenery we arrived at Esmeralda Inn. We had a pleasant reception and explored the beauties of Capra Island before supper.

Next morning we started up to Hickory Flat, seeing some pretty vistas on our way from thence to the Rock Cliff Falls, a majestic cascade, with a fall of over 200 feet. The scenery in this wild gorge is grand beyond description.

But to come to the object of my letter, we all realize that good roads are a necessity to develop the resources of Uncombe county, and we found in Hickory Nut Gap an inexhaustible supply of the best material to make macadamized roads with. It is easily accessible and can be had for the hauling. If the road from the top of the Blue Ridge to Asheville was covered with this material it would be a permanent improvement, and would add considerably to the attractions of Asheville, and make its beautiful drives still more enjoyable to visitors.
