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THE FOUR WARDS.

Ward 1. Beginning at the center of South Main street where the same crosses the southern line of the city, and runs thence with the center of said street northward to the center of College street at its intersection with North Main street; thence with the center of said College street eastward and southeastward to a point where said College street crosses the mountain or the gap between the city and the town of Asheville; thence with the center of said city line westward to the beginning. The registrar for this ward is W. A. James, Jr., whose office is at the French Bakery, 51 College street.

Ward 2. All that portion of the city of Asheville bounded by the center of North Main street and which is not embraced within the boundaries of Ward number 1, as above described, John L. Carroll, Jr., is the Second's registrar, with office in T. J. Revell's store, 30 North Main.
