AN IMMORAL ACT

Erasmus Wiman having been convicted of forgery of a particularly brazen kind there is the usual amount of complacence extended him by persons who do not see that their sympathy is immoral and harmful.

Sometimes innocent men have been judged and found guilty, as was the blessed Jesus. These judges themselves will some day stand before the bar of the Almighty.

The intention in this is that Wiman is a pure, honorable man and that the jury that found him guilty will be rebuked for their finding in the case when they come "before the bar of the Almighty." No wonder Wiman after wards said he had been the happiest Sunday of his life. His conscience had been lulled to sleep by the clergyman and he was able to believe himself the victim of a vile conspiracy.

New York is a city with enough of wickedness occurring daily, but it may easily be doubted if a more harmful, immoral act was done last Sunday than this clergyman was guilty of. Instead of upholding the law and the right; instead of laboring with Wiman to convince him of the great wrong he had done, and being him into a fit state for repentance, he deliberately placed the larger in the hands of the jury. It is a good thing that the administration of the law is left in the hands of those whose sympathy controls their judgment.

NORTH CAROLINA NEWS

—Rev. Bayless Cull is now publishing a "reform" paper at Lenoir.

—The salaries of the Wake Forest faculty have been reduced 10 per cent.

—One grover of blackberries in Wake county is now shipping 1500 quarts daily. It is a very profitable business.

—The railroad commission has begun the annual assessment of railroad, street-car and trolley property. The bill will probably be an increase in the valuation. During the past 12 months there has been little railroad building.

—The postoffice at Oklawaha is to be continued, and a colored man named Turner will be postmaster. It is a colored village. The late postmaster, a preacher, got in trouble for fraudulent practices in connection with the sale of stamps.

—The weekly crop and weather report is partially favorable. The weather is very dry in the central and western districts, but there has been more rain in the eastern district, yet it is not enough. The weather has been more favorable for cotton. Corn is doing well, better than cotton. Gardens are suffering greatly from drought. The wheat harvest is nearly over and threshing has begun. The yield is small, and a crop. Hay will be a large one and well cured. For the western district the weather during the past week has been very favorable for growing crops but for the prevailing dryness.

W. H. Kitchin Not at Rest

Chatanooga On The Edge Of It Yesterday.

The Asheville baseball players did nothing but make a box of monkeys of the so-called sluggers from Chattanooga at Allandale yesterday afternoon. There was a fair crowd out to see the game, which was as uninteresting as a match, as has been seen here in years. It was, however, a splendid exhibition of team work on Asheville's part—hitting, running and fielding. The visitors opened with Dillard in the box and there was a Waterloo in the first. Asheville got 11 men to the bat, took seven hits and scored six men. Harkins and Dillard swapped first and pitch in the second, and the locals picked out what they wanted. Chattanooga was shut out six straight, only 18 men going to the bat. In the seventh, Jumbo Litz relieved Tanner behind the bat, and the crowd had part of its money's worth in cheering him. Oldham kept his weather eye open and merely for luck knocked the ball over right fence for a home run. The homers got one and slant the men from what Knevelly papers call the "deserted village" out in the eighth, then in the third to round up their score. Setters took the box in the last and he was hit just as his predecessors were. Chattanooga got two runs before the Asheville pitcher, and the crowd gave a long call for Avery's Creek and tears of that class to come up and play the Tennesseeans.

The lynching in South Carolina is generally done by the same kind of men who lynch offenders in Ohio and Massachusetts.

THINK OF IT.

From the Haystack Home. When the people put the Republican party out of power by the election of Grover Cleveland the first time, the expenditures of the government had increased to such an enormous amount as to become a public scandal, and the treasury was exhausted.

Unfortunately for the country by the debauchery of the ballot by a large corruption fund, Cleveland was defeated in the election for the second term. Before he retired, however, though the Senate was Republican, he had reduced the national expenses of the government and restored the national treasury to a sound condition, leaving a large balance to the credit of the government and the country in a healthy prosperous condition. The Republicans once more at the head of affairs, the carnival of waste and extravagance was renewed with greater intensity—the election corruption fund had to be repaid, and political sinecures were created to reward the rascals who aided in the restoration of the reign of plunder, so far did this go that the Congress before the last under the Harrison administration was dubbed the Billionaire Congress. This body of rascals fastened upon the government appropriations to enormous amounts that it is impossible to get rid of, and which the present Democratic administration must in effect their time expires as the fault of the government is pledged to the fulfillment of the contracts upon which the appropriations were made; but the Cleveland administration is leaving out all sinecures, and cutting down all supererogatory work, while reform in the reduction of the expenses in all the civil departments of the government goes exactly on.

The Republicans had again swamped the treasury, and undone the four years of Cleveland's administration in restoring it to soundness. This is not by any means the full measure of the pettidity of that party, but by the country a financial wreck from Maine to Florida, and from ocean to ocean, and today it is Republican treachery, hedging and delay, which is preventing a more rapid return to business prosperity—they hope by so doing to regain some of their lost ground and by that means to swing back into another phase of power, to re-consecrate their reign of plunder and corruption.

Woe to this country, if, by the blindness of its people, the Republican party ever obtains the reins of the national administration again.
