The Normal and Collegiate Institute Starts Off a New Year-Politics Down in Yancey-Japan and Missionaries.

EDITOR THE CITIZEN: -On Saturday I visited the Normal and Collegiate institute, just beginning its third year. The school has opened with 121 students (107 of whom are boarding pupils) a larger enrollment than at the beginning of either of the previous years, and I understand that a number of others have engaged rooms and are expected later. The usual school course (which here includes domestic science in addition to the so-called higher branches) has this year been calarged by an admirable leature, a model school for the training of teachers; 22 young ladies are engaged in the actual practice of teaching, while

pursuing their own studies. Three new teachers have been added to the faculty, two of them graduates of Worcester University, Ohio, and the New York. I was very much pleased to meet these new recruits and observe their enthusiasm. I asked one of them about her work. With beaming eyes and a smile that must captivate the heart of any school girl shereplied: "Oh the work is delightful; I enjoy it so much. The girls are so nice to teach." I could hardly wonder at her enthusi-

asm when I looked about and saw them strolling through the spacious, airy, well-lighted halls (for it was Saturday afternoon and they were "off duty") or scattered in picturesque groups about the veranda or on the sunny lawn, on joying the exquisite view of the moun-tains on either side and chattering as only school girls can. I learned that the 'old girls' were planning an amusing little diversion, as a surprise, to entertain the new girls that evening, so there was "method in their madness" and much deep scheming in their merry eves. Not a homesick face among them. But who could be homesick in Asheville

The graduating class will this year number 22 and a finer looking set of girls it would be hard to find. May blessings attend this noble enterprise so favorably begun in our midst. A Visitor.




