## PUT THEIR FIGURES STILL HIGHER

REPUBLICANS NOW CLAIM 355 VOTES IN NEXT HOUSE.

Tennessee Has Probably Gone Democratic After all—Otherwise the Agony Continues About as It Began—A Contest on in Louisiana.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Chairman Babcock's estimate of 252 Republicans in the next house has been changed today to 255.

Vice Chairman Aspley telegraphed today from Boston, Mass., that Fitzgerald, (dem.) had been elected in the 9th Massachusetts district.

Chauncey I. Fley telegraphs from St. Louis, Mo., that Champ Clark had been defeated for Congress in the 9th district, and that the Democratic State committee conceded that the Republicans have carried the State.

Other telegrams received this morning say the Republicans have six members in Minnesota and probably seven. Congressman Aldrich of Illinois, telegraphs that all the Republican city congressmen in Chicago are elected, and that the Republicans will have 20 altogether in the State.

Aldrich's plurality will be more than 2000. It was 1800 two years ago.

Secretary Ferris, of the Republican State committee of Louisiana telegraphs today from New Orleans that he is gathering proofs of fraud which are overwhelming, and that the Republicans will contest each district and seat three members sure.

Mr. Vandevanter notifies the committee in a dispatch from Cheyenne this morning, that the Republican candidate for Congress in Wyoming is elected.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 8.—With 18 sparsely settled western counties unreported, none of which will materially change the result, Holcomb (Populist) for governor leads by 1800 votes. The balance of the Republican State ticket elected; five congressmen and legislature Republican.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 8.—Chairman Carroll of the Democratic committee claims the election of Peter Turney for governor by 4000 plurality, while at Republican headquarters it is claimed Evans has been elected by 7000. The latest returns are favorable for Turney.

ROSTON, Nov. 8.—The gubernatorial returns from the entire state with the exception of the town of Gosnell give Greenhalge 188,101. Russell 123,940. Richardson 8,142; Greenhalge's plurality 64,161.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 8.—Senator Congressmen-elect Terry and McKee say the majority of the Democratic congressional candidates in this city will be about 2,500. This district will give Terry 4,000 majority. Two years ago he received 8,000 majority.

CARSON CITY, Nev., Nov. 8.—Returns from 49 out of a total of 161 precincts indicate the election of Newlands and Jones, silver party nominees for Congress, and their governor.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 8.—Official returns from 65 counties give Holcomb (Populist) 272 plurality over Major Taylor. Nearly all the counties to be heard from are considered friendly to Holcomb.

I. B. Strode (Republican) goes to congress from the first district with 4000 plurality; D. H. Mercer (Republican) in the second with 812; G. A. Mekelejohn (Republican) in third, 3000. In the fourth the result is not yet determined. W. E. Andrews (Republican) in the fifth claims to have been elected over McKeehan by 1000. In the sixth Kem (Populist) is probably elected, but the last three districts are really in doubt yet.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 8.—Full returns today confirm previous dispatches of the election of all six Democratic candidates for congress in Louisiana. Meyer in the first, Buck in the second, Price in the third, Ogden in the fourth, Roatner in fifth and Robertson in the sixth. The Republicans announce that they will make a contest when the 54th congress meets. Attorneys have been engaged to handle cases and alleged evidences of fraud are now being gathered. Sugar planters are understood to have had spotters in all the sugar districts. The Republicans are hopeful of setting Beatty, Coleman and Kerchan seated.

KERNOWN, Nov. 8.—The total vote for Governor in New York State, Sullivan county out, stands as follows: Hill, 514,073; Morton, 667,418; Wheeler, 27,108. Total 1,208,600. Morton's plurality, 153,346. Morton's majority, 126,238.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Nov. 8.—Latest returns in the Ashland district gives Owens 118 majority.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—There seems to be no doubt that California has gone Democratic as far as the governorship is concerned, but the State will probably elect a Republican lieutenant governor and most of the other State offices. An almost solid Republican Congressional delegation is assured.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 8.—The next legislature of Michigan will be composed entirely of Republicans. The Republican State central committee has received full returns from every representative and senatorial district in the district and the Republicans have carried every district.

TOPKA, Kan., Nov. 8.—The result in the Sixth congressional district is so close that the official count will be required to determine it. With two counties to hear from, Baker (pop.) is ahead of Ellis (rep.). Both sides claim the election.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 8.—Returns being received at State Democratic headquarters show that the Republican victory in Missouri is even greater than earlier reports indicate. The Republicans will have ten representatives in Congress from Missouri, and as Hland (dem.) in eighth district, is only 19 votes ahead, with several unfavorable precincts to hear from, his defeat by Hubbard is almost certain.

SILVA, N. C., Nov. 8.—[Special.]—The school building and Masonic hall at Webster burned this morning. The fire caught from a stove pipe.

MARION, N. C., Nov. 8.—[Special.]—W. T. Crawford's majority 40 in McDowell. Entire county ticket elected.

TRION, N. C., Nov. 7.—[Special.]—Crawford beat in Polk county by about 75 votes.

H. E. Markham, DILLSBORO, N. C., Nov. 8.—[Special.]—Crawford and Pearson are about even in M. con.

RUTHERFORDTON, N. C., Nov. 8.—[Special.]—Crawford defeated by 150 to 180.

M. O. Dickerson, HENDERSONVILLE, N. C., Nov. 8.—[Special.]—John B. Arledge, Democrat, elected register of deeds of Henderson county over Clark, Republican nominee.

Two precincts give Crawford 37 majority; eight precincts give Pearson 489 majority—two precincts to hear from.

C. F. Toms, Crawford in Yancey.

A. Z. McCurry came in from Yancey county yesterday afternoon. He says Crawford's majority in that county is 235.

## FUNERAL OF THE CZAR.

The Dead Czar to Sleep With the Other Russian Emperors.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 8.—Preparation for the funeral of Alexander III. are proceeding rapidly. Funeral service will be held at the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul. The final resting place of the Czar's body adjoins that of Alexander II. The cathedral contains the bodies of all the Russian Emperors who have reigned since Peter the Great. The municipal council has passed a vote of 50,000 roubles to be used in draping the city.

The News correspondent in Odessa telegraphs: "It is believed here that the partial or total abolition of press censorship will be among Nicholas II's immediate reforms. The ceremony of receiving the people's oaths to the new Czar and the Grand Duke George has been proceeding in various churches, schools and public institutions since Nov. 2. All male citizens above 12, whatever their creed, are ordered to appear at the churches, where the oath is administered to them collectively."

## PAULINE HALL ATTACKED.

Her Husband Takes Measures Against a Clergyman.

SIoux CITY, Ia., Nov. 5.—Since Sunday night theatricals were instituted in this city, recently, the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, pastor of the First Congregational church, has led the opposition. A week ago the Pauline Hall opera company was advertised to appear, and Dr. Jenkins wrote a letter to the press, in which he said: "The character of Pauline Hall is such as to prevent respectable women from associating with her. I take it that her show is of the 'Black Crook' order, as it belongs to that class."

When the company arrived yesterday G. B. McClelland, Miss Hall's husband, instituted suit for libel against the minister. He also swore to a warrant for his arrest on a charge of criminal libel.—N. Y. Sun.

Now We Know.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The Pall Mall Gazette, commenting on Republican success in the election in the United States, says the failure of the Democrats was due to the action of the senate on the tariff question. "But," the Gazette adds, "the disgusted country has been carried away by its general and indiscriminating indignation."

## A Trap For the Chinese.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The Pall Mall Gazette prints a Yokohama dispatch saying that the Japanese are laying torpedoes at Port Arthur and are in other ways completing the trap which they have been preparing for the Chinese.

## THE STATE IS IN GREAT DOUBT

BOTH DEMOCRATS AND FUSIONISTS CLAIM THE RESULT.

The State Chairman of the North Carolina Republican Committee says the Democratic Judicial Ticket Failed to Pass—A Big Fight on Before All the Boards.

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 8.—[Special.]—It is hard to estimate on the legislature with any degree of correctness. Figures made here yesterday by leading Democrats are that it will be Democratic. The result is in great doubt; the fusionists claim it.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Chairman Babcock, of the Republican Congressional committee, received a letter this morning from A. E. Holton, chairman Republican State committee of North Carolina, claiming that the Republicans have carried that State. The following are extracted from the letter:

"Greensboro, N. C., Nov. 7, 1894. Hon. J. W. Babcock, Dear Sir: We won a complete victory at the polls here yesterday. We have elected the judicial ticket by an estimated majority over 40,000, and have both branches of the legislature with four Republican and three Populist Congressmen. The fight will have to be made tomorrow before the county canvassing boards. These boards have judicial power to investigate the legality of every vote, and upon the regularity of the returns. It will be necessary for us to employ lawyers of reputation and ability to appear before these canvassing boards in many of the counties of the State. We will be obliged to employ Democratic lawyers at good fees. Democrats say they have given up the State, but our best information is that they will appear before the boards tomorrow prepared to do all in their power."

Chairman Babcock has instructed Holton to employ all counsel necessary to protect Republican rights in North Carolina.

## ARE CLAIMING IRREGULARITIES

THAT IS THE PLEA OF THE RADICALS NOW.

They Claim Irregularities in Registration in Some Precincts and, of Course, Would Like to Throw out Second and Fourth Wards.

The Buncombe county canvassing board met in the court house at noon today, for the purpose of counting the official returns from each of the precincts in Tuesday's election. An organization was effected by the election of Chas. A. Webb as chairman and J. J. Mackey as clerk.

Mr. Pearson suggested that, for the convenience of the board, the registrar's books from Biltmore and from the Second and Fourth wards be produced, alleging that irregularities were to be found in those records.

While the clerk was transcribing the name of candidates on the abstract of returns the question of the production of the registrar's books was again brought up by Mr. Pearson, and the board passed a resolution in effect that allegations of fraud brought before the board must be in writing supported by affidavit.

J. M. Gudger, jr., opposed the suggestion and said that the books might be seen in the office of the Register of Deeds. The chairman ruled that the matter should be determined later in the course of the proceedings and the canvass of the returns began.

Mr. Pearson read an affidavit signed by G. W. Cannon, alleging irregularities in the registration of the Fourth ward, and the paper was filed. Returns of Avery's Creek, Lower Hominy, Upper Hominy, Leicester and Sandy Mush, were canvassed, when a motion prevailed for adjournment for dinner.

Papers purporting to be affidavits were read by Colonel Lusk alleging irregularities in certain precincts, but before reading them in for filing the Colonel remarked that the papers were not adjudicated, that is not sworn to, and he retained them.

The general talk on the street is that the Radicals are endeavoring to have the Fourth and Second ward vote thrown out, which would, of course, be greatly to the benefit of their ticket, as these wards gave good Democratic majorities. Democrats and Republicans are alike interested in the canvass and all are watching the proceedings closely, and with the greatest interest.

## NEW YORK'S CONSTITUTION.

It Was Passed and Will Work Many Changes.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The adoption of the constitutional amendments of which there is little question, establishes the following principles:

Laws authorizing pool selling and all forms of gambling are prohibited.

Election and registration boards throughout the State must be bipartisan. No public money shall be granted to sectarian schools. The legislature is forbidden to enact laws limiting damages for injuries resulting in death.

Personal registration is not to be required in towns of less than 5,000 inhabitants.

Public officers shall not accept passes on railroads or franks from telegraph and telephone companies.

The time which must elapse before an alien can vote after the grant of citizenship, is increased from 10 to 30 days.

Returns for the vote in this city and Brooklyn on the "greater" New York scheme indicate that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of consolidation.

Canada's Seal Catch.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 8.—The total catch of the British Columbia sealing vessels for the season of 1894 is given as 95,048 skins, the value of which will reach somewhat over \$1,000,000, the largest in the history of the industry. The catch in 1883, with a larger number of vessels employed, was 70,000, and the year before, 54,000.

Concedes the House.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Senator Faulkner, chairman of the Democratic Congressional committee, concedes the House to the Republicans by 65 to 70 plurality. The Senate, he says, will not be Republican, unless that party carries Tennessee, which is still uncertain, or unless Senator Peffer votes with the Republicans.

Had Head the Returns.

LAKE PROVIDENCE, La., Nov. 8.—News just comes here from Floyd, West Carroll parish that Tom Keys, of the firm of Keys & Pinston, was found in his store this morning with his throat cut from ear to ear.
