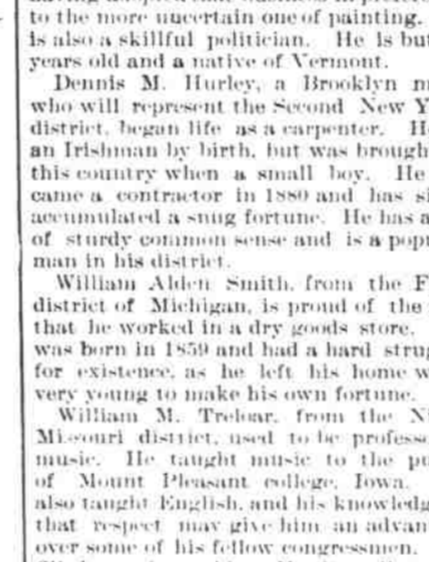
TYPES IN CONGRESS.

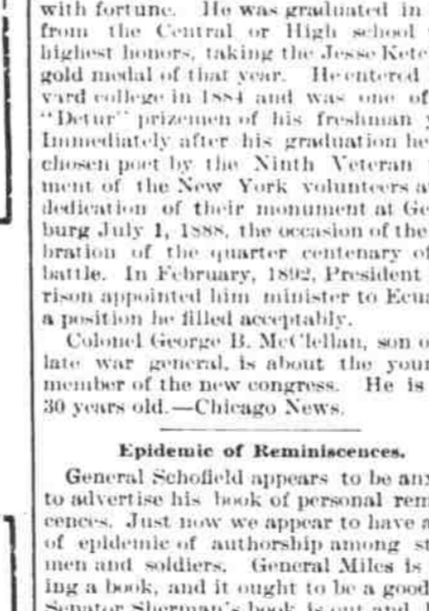

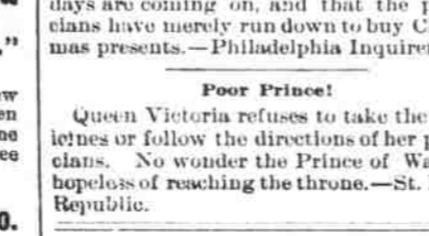
