e the duty of the secretary of the treasury to invest the surplus over that sum in United States bonds, and that when less than \$50,000,000 is in the treasury, he shall issue legal ten-

der non-interest bearing notes to make up the deficiency; that such notes shall be redeemable out of the first surplus over \$50,000,000; that in case insufficient coin to meet the coin obligations of the United States shall come into the treasury through the ordinary sources of revenue, the secretary shall exchange ordinary silver certificates for oin which is in the treasury for their edemption; that the conversion of silver certificates shall discharge the coin obligations of the United States, and that it shall be the duty of the secretary of the treasury to coin sufficient

of the silver bullion purchased under the law of July 14, 1830, to supply all deficiencies in the supply of coin (under these provisions) to meet and disharge all coin obligations presented.
