

#### SPAIN'S CHARGE OF BAD FAITH

The Three Words That Come It is Repudiated by Our Government.

People like to patronize a busy place Also by the Facts and International Law.

> EACH GOVERNMENT CAN KEEP UP THE FIGHT TILL ARMIS-TICE IS SIGNED BY BOTH.

WASHINGTON, July 28 .- It can be stated on authority that there were no vertures on behalf of Spain for peace or the cessation of hostilities until the French ambassador last Tuesday afternoon presented a note to the President. This statemen: is made with the full knowledge of European denials and must be accepted as that of the govrnment of the United States. Therfore all talk about bad faith shown by our government in pressing the Porto Rian campaign during the last few days s absolutely without foundation, and ent has done nothing that an subject it to criticism on this score.

In addition to the representatives of the United States government, persons qualified to speak for the governmen of Spain in this country make exactly imilar statements, and the alleged harges of bad faith against the United States attributed to Sagasta, are discredited as inventions designed to prejidice the successful progress of the present peace movement.

Any mere personal exchange of views etween persons in Europe could not be construed as an overture for peace, and although there may have been some of this "back door gossip" it can be again affirmed that the United States govern ment has not been a party to it. Am bassador Cambon made no overtures. direct or indirect, official or unofficial peace prior to 3 o'clock Tuesday after noon. Even supposing there had been beace overtures, which there had not been, the military authorities regard Sagasta's alleged statement that peace overtures operate to stay the course of mazing, and directly contrary, no only to the military law of the United States, but to the whole body of recognized principles of international law. In general, the international law writers igree that military operations stop only when a truce or armistice is actually concluded, and that this armistice must be in writing. Until then mere preliminary overtures toward suspension of hostilities are not regarded as any warrant for stopping the war. The agreement is binding on military commanders only from the time they receive actual notice of it. In the meanime military commanders have the right to push forward and hold such

erritory as they occupy. In the present case the armistice may nclude or exclude the Philippines of Porto Rico, as the two parties might agree, but until they agree there will be no obligation to abate military operations in any field of the operations. After the signing of the armistice preliminary to peace, a status quo will e established, and all military operaions will come to a halt at points designated, and at points not designated military operations will proceed. In the present case, if the truce is general Shafter, Miles and Dewey would simply retain the positions they now occupy and moral obligations will be imposed not to strengthen these positions or make secret preparations for more effective continuance of the war hereafter. Military authorities agree that the only qualification for this rule is that reinforcements may be sent forward and that defensive but not offen sive operations may be continued. Under such a rule Spain could continue her preparations for defending the coast of Spain after the suspension of nostilities, and at the same time the United States could send forward reinorcements to Miles and Dewey, but all offensive operations would cease.
