Nothing will be said perhaps in the reaty itself as to the institution of nerotiations to replace these old treaties with more moderate conventions, but it is not doubted that at a convenient time such negotiations will be had, though it is not desired that the conclusion of the peace treaty be retarded by embarking this time upon the discussion of these complex and delicate questions. Therefore, if this view is correct, the peace treaty will be of a few days ago, for in this single document provision will likely be made for complete resumption of relations, liplomatic and otherwise, between the wo countries.
