

### CHEERING NEWS **OF THE CONTEST**

Crawford Seems to Have More Than an Even Chance.

Committee Report Likely to be Adverse to Judge Ewart.

C., March 3 .- [Special.]-One of the most interesting bits of North Carolina news here this week is the probability that the report of the senate judiciary committee will be adverse to Judge Ewart. The case has been bandled about from subcommittee to committee and back again to subcommittee, and then into the senate, and all in all has had the most remarkable career of any judicial nomination made by the president for many years. However, information from an inside source and from one of Judge Ewart's friends is that when the committee makes its report, which may be next Monday, there is a strong probability that it will be adverse. With such a showing, if the report proves to be adverse, there can be little doubt of its fate before the senate. The nomination would be voted down in short order. CABLES SHOW AN ADVANCE A LIVERPOOL-TRADING IS IM-MENSELY ACTIVE.

New York, March 3.-The local coton market was taken completely by surprise by the action of the Liverpool market this morning. Paris, March 3.-Robert J. Thompson secretary of the Lafayette Monument commission, as special commissioner of the United States representing President McKinley and in his namepresented to President Loubet this morning the first of the Lafayette dollars, which was enclosed in a casket costing \$1000.
