PROCTOR-PETTUS ON PORTO RICO
 Further Consideration of the
 Bill in the Senate.
 Proctor an Unalterable Advo-
 cate of Free Trade Plan.
 BILL TO PAY FOR MANILA-HONG
 KONG CABLE CUT BY DEWEY
 RECOMMENDED IN THE
 HOUSE.
 Washington, March 30.—In the senate
 today the resolution offered yester-
 day by Mr. Jones of Arkansas direct-
 ing the secretary to send to the
 senate a copy of the proceedings of
 the court of inquiry called to investi-
 gate the commissary department of the
 army was passed.
 Consideration of the Porto Rican bill
 was resumed. Mr. Proctor of Vermont
 addressing the senate, he spoke as an
 unalterable advocate of the policy of
 free trade between the island and the
 United States.
 At the conclusion of Mr. Proctor's
 speech Mr. Pettus of Alabama address-
 ed the senate on some constitutional
 phases presented by the Porto Rican
 bill. "I will attempt to show," said Mr.
 Pettus "that the majority of this sen-
 ate has quit the public road—the road
 pointed out by the law of the land; and
 also show what the result of it will be.
 "In discussing this question we will
 get back to the very foundations. The
 great error of those in the majority
 our notions of justice and common
 sense. They take their departure in
 the sense that the United States is sov-
 ereign in those territories. European
 nations are sovereigns. It is not so
 and can never be.
 "We are governed in our relations
 with these territories by the laws of
 nations, so they are applicable. The
 idea is that when territory is ceded to
 the nation that the nation cannot re-
 ceive the territory as it was. It is
 owned by the people of the state. It
 must exercise away in
 accordance with its own limitations.
 When we took these islands we took
 them with the limitation of exercising
 only such power over them as was pos-
 sible in the conditions in the United
 States.
 The bill was passed for the relief of
 the heirs of Lawrence D. Bailey.
 Today in the morning under the rule,
 was set aside for the consideration of
 bills reported from the committee on
 war claims. Some preliminary routing
 business was transacted after which
 the house went into committee of the
 whole under the rule.
 Without debate the bill to pay the
 cost of repairing the Manila-Hong-Kong
 cable, which was introduced by De-
 wey, was ordered re-committed.
 The house committee on naval af-
 fairs today approved the naval appropria-
 tion bill and directed its report to
 the house. As the bill will be reported
 it provides for three battleships, three
 armored cruisers and three protected
 cruisers of dimensions heretofore
 given, and a plate for ships of the
 Maine class now in the yard.
 The proposition for a vernment
 armor factory was again brought
 forward, but no conclusive action
 was taken.
 The effort was also renewed to
 secure the construction of one or more
 of the new ships in the government
 yards, but the matter did not reach a
 vote.
 The bill carries approximately \$61,-
 000,000.

PROBABLE CANDIDATES AMONG DEMOCRATS
 THOSE WHOSE NAMES ARE MENTIONED IN CONNECTION WITH COUNTY NOMINATIONS.
 As the time for the county Democratic primaries draws near, there is considerable discussion as to the probable candidates for the different offices. Some of these are given herewith. The Citizen does not speak for those mentioned, or attempt to say whether they will be candidates, but simply gives the rumors.
 For the position of register of deeds no opposition to the present incumbent, J. J. Mackey, has developed. The same is true of Tax Collector Chambers. For treasurer, beside Treasurer Patton, Mark L. Reed and Mr. Morgan of Upper Hominy may be induced to enter the contest.
 For clerk of the Superior court Clark Erwin, J. McD. Whitson and George W. Wilson are mentioned. J. J. Judd, S. C. Gendard and E. G. Guder probably will be in the fight for clerk of the Criminal court.
 For the legislature the names of Charles A. Webb, Mark L. Reed and J. D. Murphy have been proposed. Representative James Hampton is also a candidate to succeed himself.
 For senator: Senator W. J. Cooke, Judge H. B. Carter and J. M. Gucker, Jr.
 John M. Campbell is an avowed candidate for corporation commissioner, and the name of W. W. Jones is heard in the same connection. From other counties there will be S. L. Rogers of Macon and J. J. Beacham, R. R. Cole.
 For the office of sheriff the candidates will probably be: Sheriff Lee, Jesse Pennington, James Hampton, Judge Stevens will apparently have no opposition for judge of the Criminal court.

BOERS BOMBARDING MAKEKING AGAIN
 Little Damage Done, However, in the Assault.
 May Have Been Final Effort Before Raising Siege.
 THE QUEEN SENDS HER SYMPATHY TO THE WIDOW OF GENERAL JOUBERT—THE GENERAL'S FUNERAL.
 London, March 30.—The reports that Lord Roberts will remain at Bloemfontein another month are probably intended for Boer consumption, and the recent movement of troops and other indications point to preparations being well advanced for a forward movement.
 The entire silence of the cables this morning is regarded as significant. The Boers bombarded the town of Makekeng Monday and Tuesday, but no damage, and hopes are entertained that it may prove to have been a final effort to reduce the place.
 It is now suggested that the apparent inactivity of the British at Waterloo is merely a ruse to impress the Boers with the notion that they are awaiting the Marikopa relief column when in reality is advancing by a westward detour. Color is lent to this view by the fact that 3000 troops commanded by Colonel Drummond and accompanied by three batteries, a post-office train and several wagons of ammunition, passed Bitterfontein westward on an extensive march, the objective of which is a strict secret.
 Queen Victoria has called Roberts leaving him to convey her sympathy to the widow of General Joubert for the loss of her husband and to tell the British people always regarded the dead general as a gallant soldier and a hero of the Boer war.
 The executive committee of the American hospital ship Maine has received the following letter from the secretary of the London, Mr. Newton: "I enclose you a check for 2000 pounds sterling from the Transvaal war fund to be applied to the benefit work of the American hospital ship Maine at sea for our sick and wounded troops. This check represents some of the contributions of the people of the state and the fund, and it therefore does not in any way detract from the determination of your committee to accept only American contributions for the humanitarian purposes of the Maine."
 New York, March 30.—A Herald dispatch from Pretoria says: General Joubert's funeral took place here Thursday. He will be buried this afternoon at Rustenburg in a private mausoleum with military honors. The captured British officers here sent a eulogistic notice.
 Pretoria, March 30.—A dispatch from Fourteen Streams says the Boers on March 28 opened bombardment on the British camp there and the British replied feebly and evacuated the place during the night.

FRENCH AND ARABS IN DEADLY CONFLICT
 ARABS LEFT 600 KILLED AND 100 WOUNDED ON THE FIELD—450 PRISONERS TAKEN.
 Paris, March 30.—An official account has been issued of the victory of French troops over the Arabian army at Inrar, where it assembled with the object of attacking the French expedition which recently occupied the oasis of Inalah, southwest of Algiers.
 The French learned of the scheme and decided to storm the enemy's position, which was successfully carried March 19. The town was first bombarded and then stormed. The Arab warriors making what I can call a mosque. They left 600 men killed and 100 wounded on the field. In addition 450 prisoners were taken. The French losses were nine native soldiers killed, 48 wounded and two officers wounded.

DETERMINED TO DIE.
 Blames Lillian Russell and Leaves Her His Property.
 Niagara Falls, March 30.—A sensational suicide occurred this morning on Goat Island near the spring. A man waded out as far as he could, shot himself three times in the head, pitched forward into the water and was swept down between Luna and Goat islands, going over the falls at the Cave of the Winds.
 From papers and letters left behind he is thought to be Hippolyte Schellinger of Pittsburgh. Friends here were found addressed to Madam Lillian Russell, Infanta Dabela and the Westinghouse company of Pittsburgh. In one letter he blames Lillian Russell for his death and leaves her all his property.
 The letters were rambling and indicate that the man was insane.
COMPELLED TO ADJOURN.
 Rome, March 30.—On President of the Chamber of Deputies Colombo taking his seat today for the session the extreme leftists made a tumult, shouting "Go out" and pelting him with balls of paper. As the intervention of French was fruitless, the president was compelled to adjourn the sitting. The Chamber of Deputies never allow Colombo to preside again.

NO REWARD MONEY PAID OVER AS YET
 Statement by the Chairman of the Commission.
 Not a Dollar of \$100,000 Will be Paid for Confessions.
 NO CITIZEN HAS AUTHORITY TO OFFER REWARDS FOR CONFESSIONS OF ALLEGED ACCESORIES.
 Frankfurt, March 30.—Ex-Chief Justice Lewis, chairman of the commission selected by the legislature to have charge of the Goebel reward fund, today made the following statement concerning the story sent out from Winchester yesterday that Attorney Scott had proposed to a relative of H. E. Youtzy to give him a portion of the reward money for a confession of the details of the conspiracy to assassinate Goebel:
 "The money was appropriated by the legislature to be used in running down the assassins of Goebel, to be distributed as provided at the first meeting of the reward commission, so much for the conviction of each accessory.
 "The preliminary work is in the hands of Commonwealth's Attorney Franklin, and no private citizen has authority from Mr. Franklin or from the commission to offer rewards for confession of alleged accessories.
 "Not a cent of the \$100,000 has been spent, and I think you can safely say not a dollar of it will be paid for confessions."

GOOD ROAD WORK.
 What Citizens Have Done for a Road in Upper Newfound Neighborhood.
 Squire J. L. Williamson of Leicester township was in town today and gave The Citizen a call. He says the citizens of the upper Newfound creek neighborhood met Monday at what is known as the Hearn lane, a very bad section of the road leading from Asheville up Newfound creek and across the mountain into Haywood county, and decided to macadamize the road. In three days more than 300 wagon loads of stone had been used to make a firm stone roadway about 177 yards in length.
 The road is the principal outlet for the lumber and had become almost impassable.

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ASKED \$5000 DAMAGES; GOT ONLY 61 CENTS
 DECISION IN A PITTSBURG CASE IN WHICH CONGRESSMAN WHITE FIGURED.
 Pittsburg, Pa., March 30.—The jury in the case of Assistant District Attorney Walter E. Billows, colored, against William J. McCarthy, a prominent restaurant keeper, who refused to serve a meal to the plaintiff and his companion, Congressman George H. White of North Carolina, also colored, returned a verdict today in favor of the plaintiff for \$5000 damages.
BELIEVED TO BE FIGHTING.
 Gen. Hernandez Reported to be Very Near City of Bolivar.
 New York, March 30.—A special from Port of Spain, Trinidad, says: The steamship Bolivar, due here from the city of Bolivar, Venezuela, yesterday, to connect with the European mail steamship, has not arrived. The fact is regarded as an indication of fighting in the city of Bolivar.
 It is reported that General Hernandez is very near the city. Three gunboats are near Bolivar, watching the movements of General Bolivar, who is in command of the government forces.
HANGED AT MANILA.
 Manila, March 30.—Morales and Gonzalez, who were found guilty of murdering a countryman, were hanged at noon today in the plaza in front of the church at San Varios, province of Pangasinan. An officer of the Seventeenth Infantry presided at the execution. There was no demonstration.
