

SENATOR PETTUS AS A FUNMAKER

Funniest Speech Heard in Senate in Many Years.

He Looked Solemn While Oth er Senators Roared.

THE AGED ALABAMIAN SHARP ENS HIS WIT AT EXPENSE OF SENATORS GALLINGER AND BEVERIDGE.

Washington, March 31.-Merrimen swept away the traditional dignity yesterday afternoon. Staid sticklers for senatorial decorum literally held their sides and shouted with laughter, while the crowded galleries joined in the laughing tumult which not the faintest effort was made to restrain. Senator Pettus of Alabama, the old-

est member of the body, his age being only a few months short of four score years, delivered the funniest speech heard within the senate chamber in many years, It sparkled with wit and bubbled over with humor. Its sarcasm was keen, but not bitter; and even those who were the victims of it could not but enjoy its perfect good humo and its unalloyed fun. Throughout Ital Mr. Pettus was as solemn as if he were delivering a funeral oration. Not smile softened the deep lines of his strong and rugged countenance, and, as he stopped occasionally to mop the perspiration from his face and baid head with a silk bandana he glanced about the senate as if in surprise at the laughter of his colleagues. Indeed he apologized once for the lightness of the vein in which he was addressing the senate on so important a question

as the Porto Rican bill. Mr. Proctor had delivered a forceful argument in support of free trade with lowed by Mr. Pettus, who devoted the first part of his remarks to the constitutional phase of the subject. Then quite unexpectedly came the fun as he sharpened his wit at the expense of Gallinger of New Hampshire and Mr. Beveridge of Indiana. Senator De-pew was the first to congratulate Mr. Pettus and the New Yorker's hearty hand-clasp was followed by such an ovation as a man seldom receives in

It was marvelous in all its parts, t was so marvelous that I dare say hat such a thing has never before een heard in the senate. When you ge genuine orator he is absolutely abolved from all rules of logic or comon sense. (Laughter). When it is necssary in the fervor of oratorical floures to prove any proposition, true o alse rules of common sense and the event observance of what is due to thers must not stand in the way of aintaining 'my reputation' as an ora

Congressmen Sending Out Their Quetas of Seeds.

MR. CRAWFORD'S MANNER OF DOING THIS AS COMPARED WITH THAT OF CONGRESS-MAN PEARSON.

Washington, D. C., March 31 .- [Spe ciall-This is the season of the year when members of congress are looking to it that their quotas of seeds are all distributed to constituents. Northern members do not have to hasten so much, because the season is later there in the south, however, members have to see to it that their quotas of 5000 packages are in the mails and delivered at local postoffices by the present time, so that they may be used for the spring planting.

Representative Crawford has already sent his quota to various people in the Asheville district. He has a fixed policy about the distribution of seeds, which is not true of all other members of the house. Mr. Crawford sends a package of seeds to everybody who places a request for the same, without inquiry whether the applicant is a Democrat or Republican After all applications have been answered with a package, Mr. Crawford sends the remainder of his quota to different friends throughout the district. Generally most of this remainder went to the Democrats whose names he has on a list. Each package contains rive packages of different varieties of seeds. These include garden, field and nower seeds and are supposed to be of better variety than in former years. Mr. Crawford, however, did not send out any tobacco seed this year, unless ome applicant specially desired it. In times gone by, when the standard of seeds furnished by the agricultural department was not good, tobacco seeds vere planted in the Ninth district, and some were late and some were early ants, and the tobacco growers found hem very unsatisfactory. So Mr. Crawford has abstained from sending obacco seed to his constituents. PEARSON'S COURSE.

His course in distributing seed guite different from that followed by Mr. Pearson, his predecessor, who un-dertook a very foolish course of requiring a Republican county convenion endorsement to every application before it could be granted. It seemed very ridiculous to Mr. Crawford to require a constituent to ride three four miles on a mule to be able to get an endorsement for a package of seeds that might be bought for 10 or 15 cents. He has, therefore, taken the very reasonable ground that he is quite ready to grant these little favors to Repubicans as well as Democrats. In fact be more enlightened policy that all up date members of congress follow is that in doing errands in Washington and in accomplishing legislation they work for their whole district and no necessarily for one party or the other Another of the perquisites which embers of congress have, is the dis ribution of more or less government ublications.
