New York, July 6.—The stirrup cup steeplechase, the feature of the card at Sheepshead Bay today, was won easily by the favorite, Tankard. This race is for gentlemen jockeys and is over the full course. Coming to the Liverpool jump the second time around, Sigbee fell, his rider, Kelly, remounted and started after his field. His chance seemed hopeless as the three horses in front of him were about a quarter of a mile ahead. At the last jump, Howard Gratz fell and Kelly began to ride hard. Evans held his horse, Howard Gratz, and mounted as Kelly was passing him. In a head finish for the third money Gratz gained the decision by a head. Evans was loudly cheered when he returned to the scales.

Dublin, carrying 124 pounds and making all the pace, won the fifth race in the fast time of 1:33 4-5.

REDUCED MILE RECORD. Chicago, July 6.—Alan A. Dale, who reduced the world's mile record (circular track) to 1:37 3-5 last week at Washington Park, today won at a mile and seventy yards in 1:43 1-5, knocking two-fifths of a second off the track record. The performance was remarkable in view of the track conditions.

The course, which was very sloppy Saturday, dried out exceptionally fast but was not thought to be up to record breaking qualifications. Alan A. Dale won just as he pleased from Jack Demond. Gregor K. beat Bondage in the mile and sixteenth race. Lige, backed from 15 down to 1 by E. Corrigan and his friends, won the first race. Weather clear; track good.

MONROE RODE SPLENDIDLY. Detroit, July 6.—Monroe's riding was the feature of today's racing at Highland park. He had the mount of three of the first four winners and was second in the other event.

Jockey Hopkins on Moreta, was thrown in the first race and badly injured by being stepped on. Sailor Luch, favorite at even odds, carried a big bunch of money in the fifth number and his winning by a nose brought horse and Jockey J. Walsh an ovation.

THE REGIMENTAL ENCAMPMENT HERE? COL. FRANCIS MACON IS HERE AND HIS OFFICIAL REPORT WILL DECIDE.

Colonel Francis Macon, quartermaster general of the North Carolina State guard, arrived by the morning train from the east and is at the Battery Park.

Colonel Macon's mission here is to examine and report the advantages offered and inducements Asheville for a regimental encampment this summer. Other places, including Charlotte and Greensboro are eager to secure the encampment and it will be awarded to the city which affords the most inducements. It is understood that because the appropriation for the encampment is limited it will not necessarily go to the city with the best climate or natural advantages. Both Greensboro and Charlotte offer financial considerations. Col. Macon will be met this morning by the mayor and secretary of the Board of Trade and by Major White G. Smith and Captains Lindsey and Hearn.
