SUNDAY LAWS AIRED AGAIN

BOARD OF ALDERMEN PASSES NEW ORDINANCE ON ITS FIRST READING.

SODA WATER AMONG THE ARTICLES ALLOWED SOLD

"Baggage" Ordinance Laid on Table Indefinitely by Unanimous Vote.

The discussion of a proposed ordinance providing for a less strict observance of the Sabbath was the feature of the meeting of the Board of Aldermen last evening. The resolution was introduced by Alderman Sikeleather and was discussed at length by Dr. R. E. Campbell, the Rev. Frank Siler and the Rev. W. T. Capers. On a vote the board divided evenly, but Mayor Barnard cast the deciding vote for the affirmative.

An interesting fight was expected when the "baggage" ordinance came up on its second reading, but the aldermen were evidently tired of speech-making and the many attorneys present representing the parties interested were given no chance to address the board, the ordinance being laid on the table indefinitely. Other matters of interest, including light, sewer and water petitions, were considered.

A recommendation of the water committee that water rents for buildings occupied by more than one tenant be charged to the owner or authorized agent was carried.

The city engineer was ordered to prepare plans and estimates of cost of a six-inch water main on West College street from North Main to Haywood street.

A recommendation of the park committee that a light be placed in Astor Park was referred to the light committee.

The committee on public safety recommended that a book shop on South Lexington avenue be ordered torn down, it being in a dangerous condition. The recommendation was adopted.

Can Hold Shoots.

The committee also recommended that the present ordinance prohibiting the firing of a gun in the city be changed so as to allow the Asheville gun club to hold its shoots within the corporate limits. This was adopted. As the recommendation of the sewer committee a sewer was ordered laid on Spruce street from College to Woodfin streets. The bonds of Tax Collector Chambers and City Clerk Halyburton were accepted by the board.

The officer of the Mountain City Distilling company, was accepted.

Soda Water Law. Alderman Burnette moved the adoption of an ordinance allowing the sale of soda water, ices, peanuts, confections and like articles, in addition to the articles now on the "free" list. An amendment of Alderman Allen that the shops should be opened from noon until 8 o'clock only was lost for want of a second.

Dr. R. E. Campbell, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, spoke against the adoption of the ordinance. He said he opposed it because it is contrary to American principles because of the relaxation of the Sabbath laws is contrary to the teachings of history. The American people, he said, seemed to be bent on breaking down the very laws that have shielded them in the past. Finally, said Dr. Campbell, he opposed the adoption of the ordinance because it would deprive man of his God-given right.

He reviewed briefly the history of the Sunday laws in Asheville and closed with a statement that the people of Asheville will not forget the action of the board on this question. "You may think they will," he said, "but we will see that they do not."

The Rev. W. T. Capers, pastor of Trinity Episcopal church, spoke briefly on the question. He said he believed the board was looking too keenly at the material side of the question, overlooking its desire for the material prog-

ress of the city. He declared that the greatest benefits to the city will come from the use and not from the abuse of Sunday. The speaker told of the experience of other cities that adopted "wide open" Sunday laws and urged the board to take warning from them.

The Rev. Frank Siler, pastor of the Central Methodist church, said a few words along the lines followed by Dr. Campbell and Mr. Capers.

On a vote Alderman Burnette, Randolph and Sikeleather voted aye, and Aldermen Jones, Allen and Fitzpatrick no. The mayor voted aye and the proposed ordinance passed its first reading.

Baggage Ordinance. The baggage transfer ordinance was laid on the table by a unanimous vote. An application for a light on Charlotte street near the intersection of Baird and Broad streets was referred to the light committee.

Mr. Randolph said it had been reported to him that hackmen, express companies and other persons are charging excessive rates for delivering persons and packages into the added territory and asked what should be done in the matter. After some discussion the city attorney was ordered to look into the matter and prepare any ordinances that may be necessary to make the laws now in force in the old city operative in this territory.

At the recommendation of the light committee a light was ordered placed on Jefferson drive near the residence of Mrs. Fisher.

A jury was ordered placed on the Beavercreek road to condemn the right-of-way.

Substitute Police Judge Carter tendered his resignation, to take effect on the return of either Judge Stevens or Judge Jones. The resignation was laid on the table for one week.

The street committee was ordered to investigate the condition of short streets and report.

A request of P. McIntyre for a wholesale liquor dealer's license was granted.

To Repeal Ordinance. An ordinance proposed by F. SIKLELEATHER providing for the repeal of that ordinance requiring merchants to make sworn statements of sales each year was passed on its final reading.

Building permits were issued as follows:

To the Catholic church, for an eight-room residence on Flint street, to cost \$1,000.

To Wynyah Sanitarium, for a six-room residence near the sanitarium to cost \$1,000.

To John W. Hailley, for a residence on Chestnut street to cost \$1,500.

To F. L. Johnson, for an addition to a residence on Woodfin street to cost \$250.

To W. Cooper, for a store room on North Main street to cost \$750.

A petition for a sewer on Iola circle was read and referred to the sewer committee.

A petition asking that the city market be closed July 4 was granted.

After transacting some minor business the board went into executive session. During this session it was ordered that the city engineer advertise for bids for the construction of a cover for the standpipe. The board adjourned at 10:15 o'clock.
