A Few Fall Fashions.

Most blouses and shirt waists fasten down the back or have an invisible fastening in the front. They are generally tight fitting around the waist and this necessitates linings and buttons or clasps a deep grade well-boned. Sleeves should have fullness at the top and even this is much less than last season, blouse and coat sleeves are distinctly tight from elbow to wrist.

Coats are to be of three lengths, very short, single or double breasted and snugly fitted to the figure but worn only with the suit.

The second in length reaches to the knees, both back and fronts to be fitted into the figure, third is very long, and much like the old fashioned redingote, this is also tight fitting and reaches almost to the bottom of the skirt, this coat is to be worn principally with long skirts and dressy costumes, and may be in contrast to the suit.

The line of the shoulder on all waists is not so deep as last season, making it easy to remodel old waists, as it is a much more simple matter to cut away material than to lengthen.

The average tramp will not work if he can possibly help it and for this reason is entitled to no aid or sympathy whatever. He is a parasite pure and simple. Society does itself a wrong when it allows sympathy and charity to be extended in any manner to him. The old doctrine that if a man will not work neither shall he eat should be made to apply in the most literal sort of way to this social pest.

We lately passed through a twenty mile strip of country, a prairie valley with 200 foot bluffs hemming it in on either side, as charming a bit of scenery as we have come across in many a day. Still it was a hard proposition from an agricultural standpoint. The crops had been badly washed out by the floods in the valley, while the hills were at best very poor pasture ground. Beautiful landscapes and profitable farming don't mix very well.

There is not less than 20 per cent in favor of keeping high grade stock on the farm over having a scrub herd. We met men by this pedigree animals, but those well bred. This applies to all kinds of domestic animals, horses, sheep, cattle, hogs, chickens. Calling the farm a manufacturing plant, a 20 per cent loss, or extra cost of production, is something well worth investigating. It would be quickly done in any other manufacturing establishment.

We once broke in a team of very heavy draft horses to handle big stone in a quarry, and it was surprising how soon these intelligent animals learned how to pull to the limit of their strength and do it without fret or jerk, and it was interesting to watch them and note how they seemed to understand each other and work together to get the best results. Nine teams out of ten if required to tackle a very heavy load will rush and jerk when they might just as well be trained otherwise.

One trouble is that when a man finds himself the owner of a specially fine brood mare or sow he is quite likely to be tempted to sell it at the extra price others are willing to pay, when his best interests would be conserved by refusing to put a price on such an animal. We recall the case of a man who realized an income of \$150 a year for fifteen years from a brood mare.
