WILL MAKE A FIGHT FOR BIG MEETING COMMITTEE GOES TO SECURE CONVENTION FOR ASHEVILLE.

Southern Baptist Convention the Prize Now Worked for By the Board of Trade.

A meeting of the board of directors of the board of trade was held at the Auditorium yesterday for the purpose of discussing ways and means of securing the Southern Baptist convention in 1906 for Asheville. The committee having the selection of the place of meeting in hand, will meet November 2 in Chattanooga to make its decision on this point, and at yesterday's meeting it was decided to send a committee from the board of trade to Chattanooga to make a fight for the convention.

The committee will consist of the Rev. William Lunsford, of the First Baptist church of this city and Mayo A. S. Barnard. These gentlemen will leave today for Chattanooga. It was stated yesterday that Asheville fills every requirement stated by the committee and that unless the committee considers some other city more desirable in point of location or size Asheville will have the big event. Chattanooga is said to be anxious to have the convention meet there.
