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KING RETURNS TO FACE THE INDICTMENTS

Former North Carolinian Who Made Big Success in Toils of the Law.

IS CHARGED WITH FLEEING PATRONS

Ran Financial Bureau, a Newspaper and Was a Promoter on the Side.

(By Associated Press.) BOSTON, Mass., June 12.—Cardenio E. King, the financial agent, who for some time maintained extensive offices in Boston and New York, and who left this city last February, appeared at police headquarters here today and surrendered himself to answer to an indictment charging him with fleeing patrons...

The indictment, which is in 31 counts, was returned against him two months after he went away and is based on evidence of persons who claimed to have sent money to King for him to be stock for them, and that the money had been delivered...

A few days after his disappearance a receiver was appointed to take care of King's business, and after an examination of the books it was found that only a few dollars in cash and bank deposits remained...

King is a native of South Carolina. Formerly he was engaged in newspaper work but for many years he has been active as a promoter and financial agent.

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ALL CONTESTS DECIDED; NOW COME BOOMS

Result Gives Taft 603 Delegates and Seems to Settle the Nomination.

ADVANCE GUARD IS ON HAND ALREADY

All Candidates Have Their Managers on the Ground Nursing Their Booms.

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, June 12.—Late today the republican national committee completed the hearing of all contests submitted. The committee has been in session seven days and has decided contests involving 219 seats on the temporary roll call. The contests have resulted as follows:

For Taft: Alabama, 22; Arkansas, 2; Florida, 8; Georgia, 16; Kentucky, 8; Louisiana, 18; Mississippi, 16; Missouri, 6; North Carolina, 18; Ohio, 7; Oklahoma, 10; Pennsylvania, 1; South Carolina, 8; Tennessee, 18; Texas, 26; Virginia, 18; Alaska, 2; Arizona, 2; Total, 216.

For Roosevelt: Virginia, 2; Ohio, 1; Total, 3.

As Taft had 387 instructed delegates before the national committee began the hearing of contests, he still now has a total of 603 delegates instructed for him on the temporary roll call, without taking into consideration any that have endorsed or declared for him in any other manner.

The only complete defeat sustained by the Taft delegates in the contest was in the Utah Virginia district, which includes Danville, where a former delegate was elected by a vote of 16 to 16, because a man was at fault in the counting of the district delegates who had bound a roll for a candidate in his own party for white men only.

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TODAY'S GUBERNATORIAL PRIMARIES WILL CLOSE THE CRAIG-KITCHIN FIGHT

MANY INJURED IN PLATFORM GRASH

Occurred at the Unveiling of Gen. R. E. Lee's Monument Yesterday.

(By Associated Press.) MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 12.—More than a dozen persons were hurt, none of them dangerously, at Capitol Heights, a suburb of Montgomery, late today when the platform used to accommodate participants in the unveiling of a statue to Gen. Robert E. Lee collapsed.

The most seriously injured are: E. L. May, Mrs. William Knox, Mrs. W. Maybin, Miss Arline Barry, Miss Farris, Mrs. Jeff Falkner, H. C. Brown, Mrs. Harvey K. Jones, Mr. and Mrs. Gilmer and Mrs. Robert Collins.

Mr. May is private secretary to Judge Thomas G. Jones of the United States court, who was the speaker of the occasion. Mrs. Jones is the wife of the adjutant-general of the Alabama division, United Confederate Veterans.

Many Confederate veterans returning from the reunion at Birmingham stopped here to attend the unveiling exercises, and the temporary platform was taxed to the utmost.

Former Governor William C. Oates, who presided, and Judge Jones, the speaker, prevented a panic by urging those present not to be alarmed. The accident occurred toward the close of the exercises. The statue of Lee is of bronze and surmounts a column 20 feet high.

A feature of the exercises was the designation of thirteen prominent women to represent the original Confederate States. Among the injured were Mrs. Collins, representing Florida; Mrs. Gilmer, for Tennessee; and Mrs. Jones for Virginia.

The vote on the first ballot at Charlotte will be close between Messrs. Craig and Kitchin. Mr. Craig will receive a good lead from the unattached vote. I have no doubt of Mr. Craig's nomination.

Joint Debate. Interest in the gubernatorial campaign received a decided impetus yesterday, when it was announced that Mr. Craig had declined to confirm the refusal of Chairman Waddington of Mecklenburg county to arrange a joint debate between Mr. Craig and Mr. Kitchin at the Auditorium, Charlotte, Monday night. Mr. Craig is reported to have said that he would "meet Kitchin or die," and the news when circulated caused much discussion. Both men are regarded as two of the state's best orators, both statesmen of ability. The debate Monday night will doubtless go down in the political history of North Carolina as a memorable event.

It was originally intended that Mr. Craig would speak on the public square in Charlotte and Mr. Kitchin at the Auditorium. But Mr. Kitchin, seeking for a chance for a spectacular display at Charlotte, authorized his manager to challenge Mr. Craig to a joint discussion. Chairman Waddington promptly declined, but when Mr. Craig heard of it he immediately telephoned to Charlotte from the center of Mecklenburg county that the challenge be accepted. Several of Mr. Craig's friends in Asheville will go to Charlotte to hear the joint discussion.

CRAIG AND KITCHIN TO MEET IN DEBATE

Yesterday's Primaries Resulted in Increasing the Lead of Mr. Kitchin.

The last day, or nearly so, of the North Carolina gubernatorial primaries finds Mr. Kitchin leading Mr. Craig by 23 votes. Chowan and Bertie counties held their primaries yesterday with the following results:

Chowan—Kitchin 2, Craig 1, Horne 1; Bertie—Kitchin 6.43, Craig 2.57, Horne 0. The official vote of Martin county, as reported yesterday, is Kitchin 6, Craig 3, Horne 1.

SIX MEMBERS OF CAMPING PARTY ACCUSED OF KILLING COMPANION

(By Associated Press.) MOBILE, Ala., June 12.—There was a sensational development today in the matter of the death of Tucker A. Davidson, the young man who perished in the Chattahoochee river several miles north of Columbus yesterday, when E. L. Davidson, brother of the dead man, swore out warrants against Ben Lloyd, John Boggs, Bud Phillips, Lee Phillips, Judd Lloyd and Monroe Lloyd, charging them with murder.

The six defendants composed the camping party of which Davidson was a member. John Boggs, Bud Phillips and Lee Phillips say that they were in a boat with Davidson, and the boat overturned in the rapids and he was drowned. The three defendants are in jail, and the others are out under bond. Shots were heard from the direction of the river about the time the young man met his death.

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
