### WATSON TO BE TOLD HE IS A NOMINEE

ATLANTA, Ga., June 13.—A telegram was issued late today for the Georgia state convention of the poplar leaf party, which will be held in the city July 9. Thomas E. Watson will be formally notified of his nomination as the presidential candidate for president of the United States and will make his speech of acceptance. The convention, it is believed, will not name a state ticket until the afternoon of July 9. Mr. Watson will make an address on state issues, and in the evening on national matters.

CAPE STEUART TRANSFERRED.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Captain Edwin G. Stuart, corps of engineers, stationed at Sayville, Long Island, has been ordered by the war department to transfer his present duty to Fort Monroe, Va., and will make his speech of acceptance.
