**BIDS TO CLOSE ON**  
**PANAMA BONDS**  
(By Associated Press.)  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Secretary Gorton today made an announcement that he was receiving bids up to the close of business on December 4 next for \$19,999,999 Panama canal bonds or any part thereof to bear 2 per cent interest. The bonds will be dated November 1, 1908, this making it a new issue, and interest will begin as of that date. The bonds by the terms of the law authorizing their issue, will be redeemable in gold in 20 years from their date, and payable in 30 years. As an evidence of good faith the secretary requires each bid to be accompanied by a certified check payable to the secretary of the treasury for 2 per cent of the amount of the bid.

**CHARGES CRUELTY**  
**TO PRISONERS**  
(By Associated Press.)  
RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 19.—Charges of cruel and unusual punishment inflicted upon prisoners in the industrial reformatory at Huntington, Pa., were recently reviewed at today's session of the American Prison Association. D. Sulzberger, member of the State Prison Society of Pennsylvania, made the allegations and admitted they were based only on statements of former prisoners. T. R. Patton, general superintendent of the reformatory, presented the charges and a dozen delegates challenged Mr. Sulzberger's assertions. The association finally tabled a resolution offered by Mr. Sulzberger looking to an investigation of the system of punishment for reformatory prisoners in penitentiaries and reformatory schools.

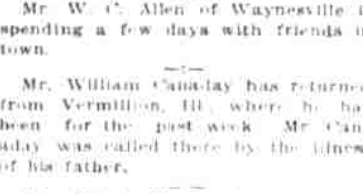
**ARMY OFFICER**

A series of practical disputes were considered and in most cases the delegates were referred to the executive committee or to the negotiating unions. Several sessions of the report was discussed at length, but in each case the recommendations of the committee were adopted.

**PEONAGE CHARGE**

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Judge Hough in the United States circuit court yesterday ordered a jury to return a verdict of not guilty in the case of David E. Hester, an agent for the Florida East Coast railroad, and three company men against a city who were accused of conspiring to hold workmen in peonage and slavery while the men were building that road.

**CHINESE ARE**  
**ousting PORTUGAL**  
(By Associated Press.)  
HONG KONG, Nov. 19.—Advices from Masao say that the Chinese continue to maintain that Portugal has practically made a renunciation of sovereignty, and have seized the Chinese flag and are collecting taxes on the peninsula. A report from Masao that the Portuguese government had decided to send a number of warships to Masao is not given credence by the Chinese who claim that only the gunboat Pacifica is coming. It is probable that the matter will be made a subject of conference between the Chinese and Portuguese authorities. The natives are said to be ready for an outbreak against the Portuguese and in their attitude they are being supported, it is claimed by the Chinese officers.
