The exhibition of the paintings of Mr. Louis Rowell yesterday at the Battery Park hotel attracted quite a number of people. The water colors which won the most favorable criticism were the autumn scenes. A characteristic of Mr. Rowell's work is the subtlety of the painting of the mountains, which loom vaguely in the distance, veiled in blue. The effect of the sun on the far away mountains is remarkably well represented. Another distinctive feature of Mr. Rowell's work is his special gift for painting water. In several of the melancholy little autumn minutiae a silver stream winds through the foreground which suggests a fountain that could only be distinguished by the intrusion of some errant water bird. In some of the pictures shown, summer—verdant, buoyant and flooded with sunshine—represented the life of the woodland that was echoed by the distant mountains. Mr. Rowell has done some excellent work which has received flattering notice throughout the county from art critics of note. An exhibit will
