"BOOKY" ARRESTED; RACING STOPPED

Governor Sanders Threatens to Take Hand Unless Betting Ceases.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 22.—After continuing for a week the race meet at Fairburn Park, Jefferson parish, across the Mississippi river from New Orleans today, was closed, at least temporarily. The announcement of suspension was made at the conclusion of the fourth race, shortly after John Sheehan, of Memphis, a book-maker had been arrested on the charge of violating the local anti-racing law. Sheehan's arrest followed a telegraphic order from Governor Sanders to the district attorney in Jefferson parish. The telegram said that unless the betting on horse races at McDonoghville, as well as the gambling at Southport, stopped immediately, he shall take a hand himself.

Turkmen, Jefferson parish officers and the public argued that if the governor's order was obeyed, the would be sent both to the suburban track at McDonoghville, as well as to Southport, of Jefferson Parish, had a consultation with friends as soon as the governor's order came and at the conclusion of the third race, Sheriff Marrero, father of the district attorney, had Sheehan and his clerk, W. E. Ralston, arrested. Sheehan and Ralston will be arraigned before a justice of the peace in Jefferson parish tomorrow.
