The following appeal is published at the request of the Associated Charities.

The Flower Mission and Associated Charities begs to call attention again to its constant applications for employment. During January most of the cases it tried to help were sickness or lack of employment.

Almost always we can furnish a woman to scrub or boys and men to do unskilled labor, such as chopping wood, beating carpets or cleaning yards. At present there are several urgent cases.

One woman, a widow, needing work at once, is capable both as a working housekeeper or as an attendant to an invalid.

Another is a young girl whose parents are almost entirely dependent on her exertions. We feel she could do office work for a dentist or doctor.

One of our boys of seventeen is the main support of an aged father and a mother who has a badly broken wrist. This boy is not vigorous enough for ordinary day labor in a factory or on the streets, but is often in doing odd jobs about a house or yard. The family is burdened with a debt which must be paid at a near date and their unsuccessful efforts to get work are pitiful.

Two other boys, not over strong, are eagerly looking for a job in a store or driving a wagon.

Occasionally when work is scarce we have skilled laborers who come to our attention through sickness in the family.

We urge that both private individuals and different industries will consider bear us in mind, that they will give us an opportunity whenever they can to give employment to some of our brothers and sisters whose need is poignant beyond our realization and whose distress is frequently due to fault of their own.
