An official dinner to American and Greek naval officers was given by the American Minister and Mrs. Richmond Pearson last night. "The royal cotillon was opened by the American Minister, dancing with the crown princess. The cotillon was led by Lieutenant-Commander Sypher and Miss Pearson.
