PLAINTIFF WINS IN SECHRIST VS. JONES

The jury which has been sitting in the case of Susan V. Sechrist vs. Heator R. Jones et al. in the superior court since Tuesday returned a verdict yesterday morning which is practically a victory for the plaintiff. The contention was over three tracts of land, the title to which was in H. E. Jones, deceased, husband of the defendant. Mrs. Sechrist claimed that two of these tracts were hers by reason of the fact that as she claimed, Mr. Jones in his life time had invested certain moneys belonging to her in three tracts although the dispute centered about one tract principally inasmuch as the plaintiff made no serious contention for one and the defendant made none for another. The jury found that two of the tracts belong to Mrs. Sechrist.

In the routine proceedings of the court in the case of the Swannanoa Lumber Co. vs. the Bryan Lumber company, appeal from justice court, was dismissed.

Several cases were continued by order of the court on the ground that there would not be sufficient time to try them at this term.

The court enters upon the last week of this term tomorrow. It is not expected that any cases of great importance will be called inasmuch as the calendar has been badly upset by the length of the trials which have been held. In yesterday's Citizen it was said that only minor matters would be taken up yesterday inasmuch as that day was the last day of the term. The word "term" was inadvertently misused for the word "week" and thus made the statement true that the term of court ended yesterday.

HORSE SHOW COMES OFF NEXT MONTH

SEVENTH ANNUAL EVENT DUE APRIL 20 AND 21.

Two New Classes Have Been Added to Increase Interest and Enthusiasm.

The prize list of the seventh annual Asheville horse show has been issued and from now on detailed attention will be given to making this event the most notable in the history of the horse show association. The office of the secretary in the Auditorium will be open daily from 9 to 1 o'clock for the listing of entries and the giving of information. Parking space will be placed on sale Thursday for the show April 20th and 21st at Riverside park.

The show will be featured by new classes and additional prizes. Mr. C. J. Harris has donated a prize of \$100 and a cup to be awarded in a class to be selected by the directors and a class termed "courtesy pair, amateur" has been added as well as handsome prizes for yearling colts which should encourage breeding. It is believed that the entries will be numerous as out of town interest has been greatly aroused.
