**Wiring of Apartment Houses.**  
In the erection of many apartment houses an important factor is frequently overlooked. This is providing convenient outlets in the kitchens and laundries for connecting electric irons and cooking utensils. The additional cost for wiring is very small and should not be considered when the great convenience of suitable connections is considered. The electric iron is rapidly becoming considered as a necessary part of the list of household utensils, and electric heating and cooking appliances are largely used.

Several receptacles in the side walls, about three feet from the floor, provide a convenient means of connecting any piece of apparatus to the house circuit. These receptacles can be of the flush type, so that when not in use nothing projects beyond the surface of the wall.
